Send a card to husband and wife, even if you know only one name. It is a common courtesy.

Red and green inks are acceptable for signing and addressing Christmas cards.

Envelopes should be addressed in handwriting, carefully and legibly. The postal zone numbers for mailings to large cities. Red-inked envelopes are acceptable.

A return address on the envelope will insure that your card won't hit the dead-letter file.

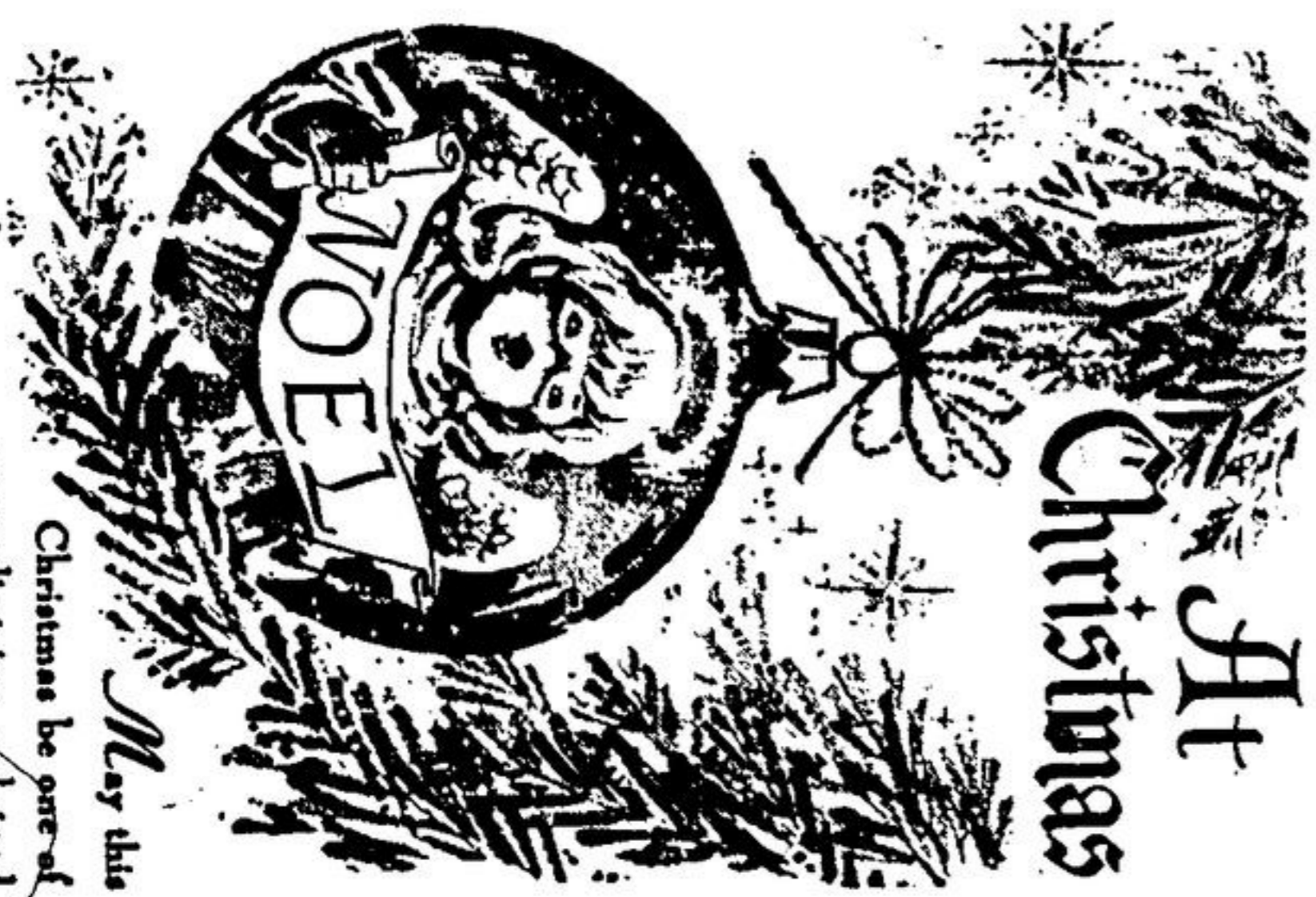
