

Pounding the Sports Beat . . .

Over in Brampton they're busy preparing for an invasion of over 1,000 boys between the ages of eight and 10 years. The event is Brampton Lions' second annual Novice Hockey Week which opens March 31 and runs to April 8.

There are entries from 48 towns and cities throughout Ontario, Manitoba and even one from the United States.

The tournament is broken up into four classifications according to population: "A" for communities over 35,000; "B" for towns of 7,501 to 35,000; "C" for 7,501 to 7,500; and "D," up to 3,000. Acton has an entry in the "C" series which includes 13 clubs: Delhi, Walkerton, Oakridge Acres, Ferguson, Hespeler, Orangeville, Milton, Markham, Uxbridge, Guelph, Aurora, Tillsonburg and Ingersoll.

Once again, the Whistler Colts will be making the trip from Manitoba, while a team from Port Huron, Michigan, will represent the United States.

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
