## March of Dimes Plans Complete Ladies to Canvass Entire Town

Working in conjunction with the Action Rotary Club, ladies from the different churches in Action will captain teams to blitz every home in town January 30 in an effort to assist the March of Dimes and aid the disabled.

"To make them fit to earn a livelihood again" is Mrs. J. Ledger's definition of rehabilitation. She is Chief Marching Mother for the 1961 Mothers' March on January 30 for the March of Dimes.

Mrs. Ledger outlined several valuable points during the Rotary Club meeting Tuesday evening, noting "The March of Dimes rehabilitation program has to include whatever it takes to bring the disabled man or woman to this goal."

### Rehabilitation Facilities

It must include surgical, medical and vocational aid; and for disabled mothers of small children, there must be housekeeping help as well. Rehabilitation facilities are readily available to any adult man or woman disabled from accident, disease, or inherent cause.

The comprehensive rehabilitation program of the March of Dimes is available to disabled mothers at home as it is to the family breadwinner. 1,104 handicapped persons were referred to the March of Dimes Rehabilitation Foundation in the past 12 months. Each was individually different as far as physical disability was concerned. Each disabled person required and is receiving individual attention.

### Alm in Independence

Sometimes expensive equipment is needed; some patients need treatment and training; others need corrective surgery. Whatever form the rehabilitating process takes, the aim is independence and self-sufficiency for the patient. Medical services provide the skills; the March of

Dimes makes it available — anywhere in Ontario.

In 1960 the March of Dimes required \$570,000 to meet the needs of rehabilitation for disabled men and women. This was about \$50,000 more than in 1959. Each year more patients are referred to the March of Dimes. None have ever been turned away and the March of

Mr. King acknowledged the variation in power coming into Action substations from Guelph and stated his department had this problem under review. He stressed the heavy demand in the Guelph area after the power had left the substation in the city.

Chairman Beatty told the H.E.P.C. representative, "We are not too happy about this situation. We are paving first class roads and not getting first class service." The commission agreed to convey their concern and dissatisfaction to the H.E.P.C. in a letter. Clerk administrator J. McGea

## BP Buys Micro No Change Seen

Announcement was made this week by Building Products Limited of their purchase of the Micro Plastics Division of Consolidated Frybrook Industries Limited. Building Products also announced the purchase of two other Canadian firms.

In the announcement to shareholders by Leonard E. Long, president of Building Products Limited, he reported:

### Extrusion Plants

"The plastics extrusion company whose assets we are acquiring is the Micro Plastics Division of Consolidated Frybrook Industries Limited. The division's office and two factories are located at Acton, Ontario and they are engaged in the extrusion of 'Carlon' Polyethylene Pipe (known as 'The Pipe with a Stripe') and also the custom extrusion of a multiplicity of sheets and shapes, some of which are finished products in themselves, but many of which are incorporated in the product of other manufacturers. As we have been doing considerable research and experimental work on plastic building elements, we feel that the organization, know-how and equipment acquired in this purchase will be of great assistance in diversification and expansion of the company's sales and profits."

No changes in the operation or personnel of the Micro plant are contemplated in the immediate future.

### Began in 1946

Micro-Plastics commenced operation in Acton in July, 1946, when the plastic industry was just getting started. The growth of the company has been steady and in 1957 the original plant had grown to 30,000 square feet.

At that time the building covered all the property available at that location and 14 acres were purchased on Main St. North.

Here a 40,000 square-foot plant was erected and the head office and some of the manufacturing operation were moved to this location. The original buildings on Wallace Avenue continue in use as the pipe manufacturing plant. Micro was purchased in
