Accounts approved for payment included: general accounts, \$412.87; road accounts, \$15,020.13.

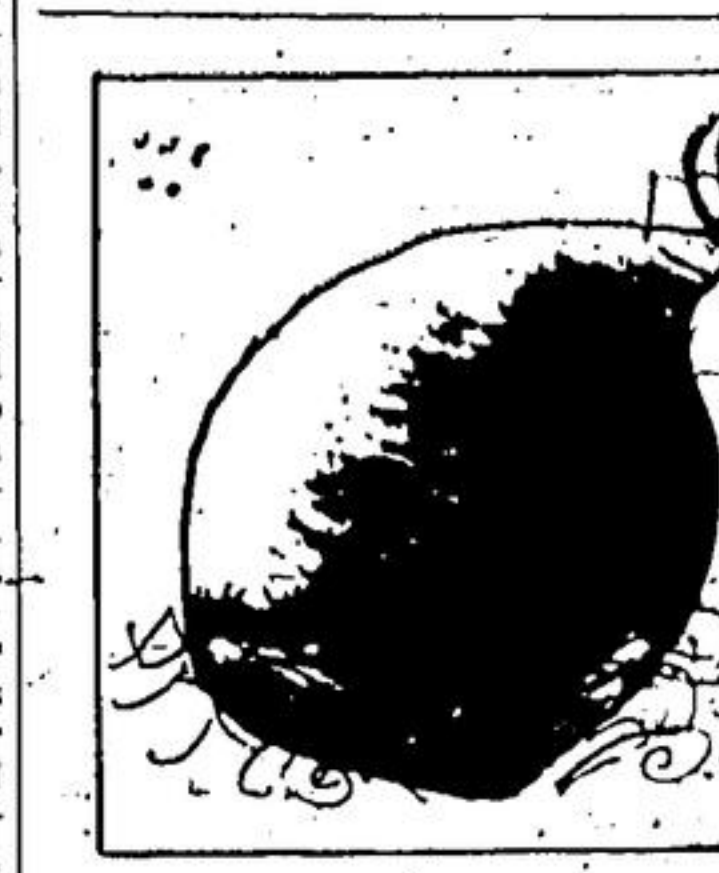
