Chain of Events

A slight bump into the rear of a car waiting at the stop lights can have serious consequences, points out the Ontario Safety League. If the driver waiting for the light to change is standing in line, a common driving error—a bump can cause his foot to slip off the clutch, allowing the car to lurch forward, momentarily out of control. Even if there is no collision with cross traffic, or pedestrians, the "whiplash" effect of the sudden lurch can seriously injure the neck of anyone in the car.

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
