Special Contests Planned '61 Fair Midway Engaged

In spite of blizzard conditions on Monday night the directors of the Acton Agricultural Society held their first meeting of the year to discuss plans for their 1961 program.

Following the reading of the minutes by the secretary, the chairman, Nina Braida, reported that a contract had been signed with Green Amusements of Toronto for midway concessions for the 1961 Fall Fair.

Adult rides include ferris wheel, tilt-a-whirl, flying scooter, roller-plane, spit-die cars, merry-go-round, kiddie cars, merry-go-round kiddie planes and ponies. Also, in the contract are provisions for free booth concessions for the women's institute and three church groups. The directors are looking forward to the largest midway in many years.

Three Field Contests
Due to their wide acceptance by district farmers, three field crop competitions will be held in hay, oats and silage corn. Hay competitions will be limited to first year stands of grass legume mixtures. These competitions are designed to encourage farmers to sow only the best seed and to make them more conscious of weed and disease control.

For the young people of the area, two 4-H agricultural clubs will be offered, the Acton 4-H Forage Club and the Acton-Massagway 4-H Call Club. These clubs will be sponsored by the Society and organized under the policy of the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

The commercial features selected for this year will be the very popular market cattle classes and two classes of cured hay. The hay exhibits will comprise of a five pound sample in a cellophane container.

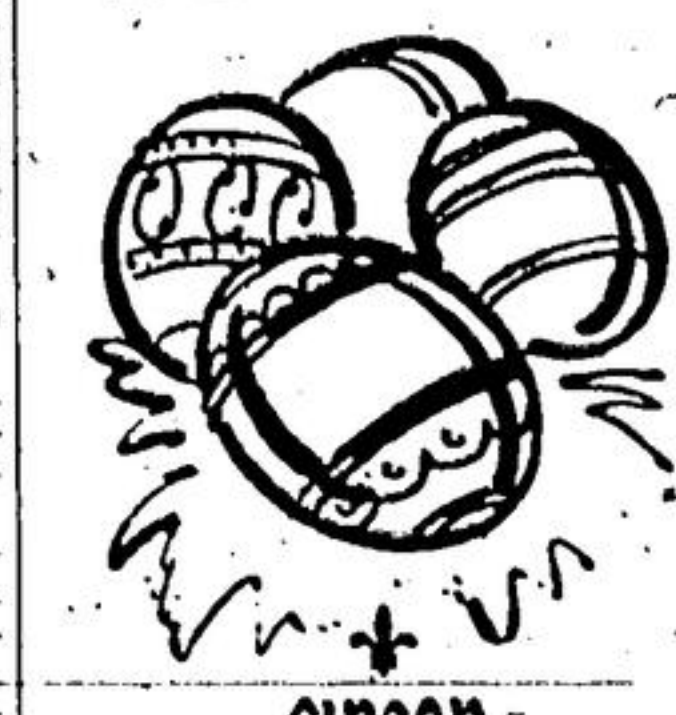
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
