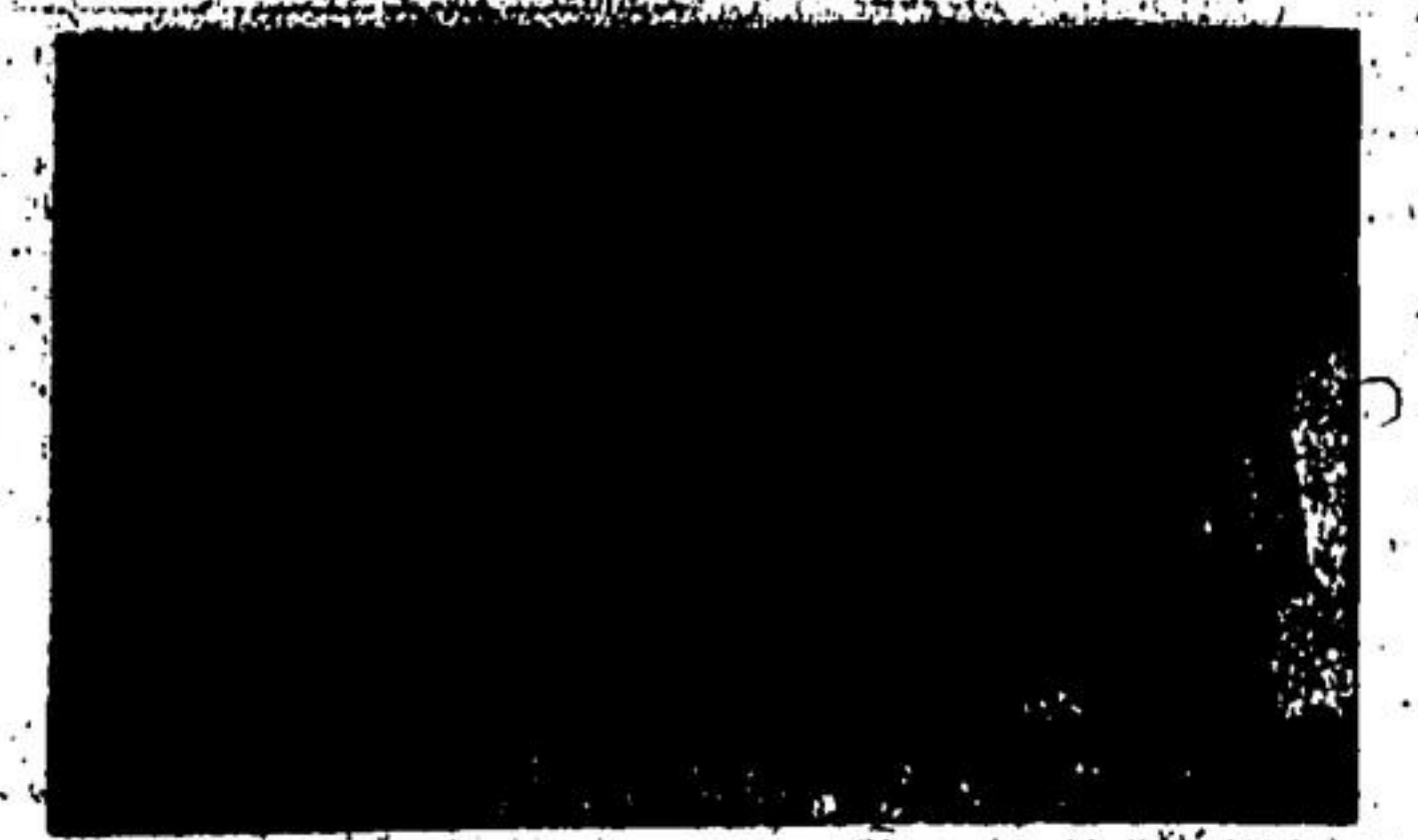
work. Banners are being awarded to the top classrooms in each of the county's schools, and the program will probably get underway in April.

Active Committee At their recent meeting, members of the Bureau heard an excellent report from Bert Groll, Trafalgar, on the activities of the new farm fire safety committee. This committee has been compiling facts and figures on barn and other farm fires, taking photographs of actual hazards found on the farm, preparing literature for distribution through farm agencies, and arranging to form a group of speakers for farm organizations. Their important aim is to inform all Halton farmers that fire prevention is as important as fire protection, and to receive better cooperation in their joint effort to cut down on mounting fire losses.

The Bureau has agreed to invite non-firemen to attend monthly meetings, in an effort to broaden the scope of the Bureau's work. Commercial and industrial representatives are especially invited to participate in the work of the organization, and volunteers are being urged to combat the Fire Chief in their municipality for more information.

Tips on Photography You Can Erect Your Own Darkroom

If you've ever thought of developing and printing your own pictures, probably you've asked yourself, "What will I ever do about a darkroom?" Well, the purpose of this column today is to report to one, and all that darkrooms shouldn't present a problem for anyone. In fact, if you're just interested in simple printing, a darkroom isn't even necessary. You can print your snapshots right in your kitchen or any other room, where there's running water. On the other hand, if you want to develop films or make enlargements from a darkroom or a room that can be darkened, is pretty much a necessity.

Handle in Dark There are, however, many ways of making the problem of total darkness unnecessary. You may be able to meet this need by building a small collapsible shell or a permanent one, in a closet which has a good light door. You don't even need a skylight because with today's roll film developing tanks, all chemical processing operations can be handled on a time-temperature basis in full room illumination once the film is loaded into the tank. And film handling should, preferably, be handled in total darkness.

Some folks are lucky enough to have really large closets at home and they use such closets, equipped with safelights, for on-loc printing with regular high speed negative photographic papers and for enlarging. Usually, in such cases, they wash their finished prints in either the kitchen

or bathroom. Still others just hang a few light proof curtains over either kitchen or bathroom windows and do their print making in such rooms during the evening. But if you want to build a simple darkroom, you can do so in almost any part of the house, garage where it won't get too hot in the summer, or too cold or damp in the winter. A space 4 x 6 feet, is quite adequate, and if possible, running water and a sink for print and film washing purposes should be available. The darkroom should have a shelf about two feet wide along one side to hold your enlarger, and printer, boxes of paper, etc., the sink and perhaps a well drained shelf for trays of chemicals along the other side. Storage shelves for bottles, trays, tanks, paper, etc., should be hung in appropriate locations. And, in most cases, the safelight should be located above the sink.
