## Hydro Reviews Heater Program Adopts H.E.P.C. Recommendation

During a review of the hot water heater program launched by Acton Hydro recently, members discussed the problem of billing ratepayers with unbalanced elements on their heaters, and agreed to adopt a recommendation from Ontario Hydro.

The recommendation allows a difference in the rating of the top and bottom heater band elements and lays out a charge schedule.

Following an enquiry the commission agreed that private contractors could not claim the service call charge if they repair a water heater and stressed that hydro employees would handle this service in the application of Hydro heater rentals.

Hydro superintendent Doug Munson was requested to submit actual costs on installation of a rental water heater in order to estimate the actual cost for this program. Previously hydro had set the cost at \$20 per installation but Mayor John Goy reminded his colleagues they may have been too hasty.

The superintendent gave a work report for the next two weeks following a request from the chairman during a recent meeting.

Esqueuing School Board finalized the year's budget during a recent meeting and sent a requisition to township council for \$83,000 to meet requirements for 1961. This will not alter the tax rate of last year.

During the meeting the board members reviewed surveys of levels of properties for the proposed new school to accommodate pupils at Limehouse, Blue Mountain and Bannockburn schools.

Final arrangements regarding a suitable location will be completed at a later date after a meeting with architects.

The board approved a \$75 donation to the Halton Music Festival being held in Acton in April.

Members met with George Heavys, son-in-law of Mrs. Hepburn, wife of the school bus operator who died recently, and finalized details for the widow to carry on bus operations under the plan formulated by the late Mr. Hepburn. School bus operations will be under the management of Robert McMaster.

## Statues Draped Before Easter Church Flower-Filled Sunday

This week the Roman Catholic Church celebrates in her liturgical year the most solemn events of the Christian religion, Good Friday on one of the days that stand out in the way.

On Palm Sunday at St. Joseph's Church the palms were blessed and distributed by Father V. J. Morgan assisted by Father B. M. Dougal, SJ of the Jesuit Novitiate. Palm Sunday is a memorial of the Catholic Church and they are distributed to the faithful each Palm Sunday. The principal purpose is to remind parishioners of the triumphal entry of our Saviour into Jerusalem.

On Holy Thursday (today) there will be High Mass at 8:30 p.m. followed by public adoration of the Blessed Sacrament after

Mass until midnight.

On Good Friday there will be Public Adoration of the Blessed Sacrament from 9 a.m. until 3 p.m., followed by Solemn Liturgy and Way of the Cross at 7:30 p.m.

Holy Saturday ceremonies begin at 10:45 p.m. followed by High Mass at midnight.

On Easter Sunday there will be Masses at 9 and 10:30 when Father Morgan will be assisted by Father M. Dougal. The senior choir will be singing at the low mass and the children's choir at the High Mass. Miss Irene Mulholland is organist and choir leader.

Since Passion Sunday all the statues and crucifixes have been draped in purple, but on Easter Sunday the mourning season is over and the altars will be profusely decorated with flowers.
