Man, 52, Girl, 14, Dead

Order Inquest April 10 Into Double Shooting

A public inquest into the Harley-Grubb double shooting is to be held April 10 at 8.30 p.m. at the court house, Milton.

The shooting took place around 8.30 Monday evening at a Department of Highways owned residence at the Highway 25 and 401 Cloverleaf south of 401. Linda Kay Barclay, 14, was shot in the back by Herbert Peter Grubb, 52, as a result of what police described as a jealous one-sided love affair. During the argument, the girl apparently attempted to run out of the room into a rear sun porch. When the man fired the shot, he then

turned the 12 gauge shotgun on himself.

The dead girl's mother Mrs. Ruth Johnson and her two younger sisters were living at the residence at the time of the shooting. Mrs. Johnson had been Grubb's housekeeper for several months.

Corporal Charles Wilkinson of the North Halton provincial police said that after the shooting, one of the girl's sisters ran out onto the road and stopped two passing trucks. They immediately went across the road to Johnson's Trucking Ltd. and phoned the police.

pronounced the two dead at the scene.

Four Investigating O.P.P. officers were Corporal Wilkinson, Constable Carmen Wright, Constable Dave Hardy and Corporal L. Pelissero, the police photographer.

The funeral of Linda Barclay will be held this afternoon in Milton, followed by burial at Millington, Michigan. The body of Herbert Grubb has been taken to Syracuse by relatives and burial is to take place today (Thursday) in the Courtland Cemetery.

Mrs. Johnson and her two daughters are presently residing in a private home in Burlington.

Tips on Touring

We women aren't supposed to be good at figures, but here's one statistic that should make us take notice: In a recent check, it was discovered that faulty tires were responsible for 19 per cent of all traffic fatalities due to equipment failure.

Protect yourself and your family by following these ten tips on tire care, passed on to me by automotive experts:

1. Keep your tire pressure at the correct level -- never under-inflate. Check them (when cold) before any long trip.
2. Have wheel alignment and balance checked at least once a year.
3. Every few months have the tires checked inside and out for damage such as cuts, abrasions, uneven tread wear, etc.
4. Have the tires rotated every 5,000 miles.
5. Never drive on slick, worn tires.
6. If you do a bit of highway driving, buy special high-speed tires.
7. Save extra speed for passing.
8. Take it easy in rough roads.
9. Never ride the shoulder of the road.

Structural Engineering Studies To Determine Condition of Arena

The Community Centre Fund committee held their regular meeting on Saturday morning. Committee chairman presented their reports which included the detail plans for each section of the project. Chairman reported the completion of their committees. Some committees are not yet complete but contacts with individuals are being made this week.

A proposal for an artificial ice plant was received and progress was reported on the structural engineering studies being made on the present arena building.

All phases of the campaign were discussed and approval was given to various segments of the plan. The major policy discussion again emphasized that if sufficient money is not pledged to complete the whole project no one part of the project will be undertaken and all money collected will be returned to the contributors.

Plans are proceeding on schedule and it has been decided the actual canvass will be made in the late spring so that it will be possible to start construction during this building season.
