Easements Granted at Hearing Residents Raise no Objections

No objections were raised during a public hearing Thursday evening, March 30 and the committee of adjustment gave the all-clear signal for the erection of a Federal Post Office at the corner of Alice Street and Bower Avenue as well as the construction of a shopping plaza on Block "A" in the Bradda subdivision.

During the first hearing four residents were present and voiced no objection to the erection of a Post Office and the committee in granting the easement to the zoning by-law made a recommendation that a planting strip be installed at the rear lot line adjoining H. Cole's property as well as other internal lot lines surrounding the proposed building.

Present for the first hearing were Mrs. L. Week, H. Cole and Mr. and Mrs. Caslovich.

Shopping Plaza

During the second hearing to allow an easement to A. Fry for erection of a shopping plaza in the Bradda subdivision E. Bradda and E. Lynch were present and requested a proper planting strip be installed around the area.

In granting the easement the board recommended that proposed plans be altered to delete the southerly entrance to the shop plaza and provide a wider entrance on the northerly approach to allow a centre island for exit and entrance of vehicles.

It was also recommended the centre building plan be moved east.
