Approve \$80,000 Debenture For New Four-Room School

Tentative approval was given Tuesday, April 4, during the Erin Township council meeting for a debenture issue to erect a new four-room school in the area. This action followed a request from the area school board.

When final approval is given and plans are completed the new school will be erected between the seventh and eighth concessions, above 24 highway and will accommodate pupils from Brisbane as well as the overflow from other schools in the district.

Confirmation was given for an additional \$4,000 payment to the Hall construction company. To date the company has received a total of \$22,000 for erection of the municipal hall.

Saturday Snow

Nine Accidents, Four Injured

A heavy fall of wet, slippery snow on Saturday, April 1, caused a lot of grief for many motorists in town and district. North Halton O.P.P. report nine accidents during the day, five of them of a minor nature and the others injuring four and causing a total of \$2,300 in damage.

Antionette, 13, and Wouter Tryssenaar, 11, children of Laurens Tryssenaar of R. R. 3, Acton, were injured around 1 p.m. in a two-car accident on the First Line, Esquesing, just north of No. 7 Highway. Antionette received a crushed skull and bruises, while Wouter had a lacerated face, broken right knee and shock.

They were passengers in a car driven by their father, which was in collision with one driven by Charles Bick, Toronto. Bick received a bruised chest and sprained right wrist, while a passenger had a bruised chest.

Just before noon, four cars driven by Kitchener, Galt and Toronto motorists, were involved in two accidents on Highway 401 near the Guelph Line, Nassagaweya.

Police Constable Ron Stratton explained the first two cars collided and a third stopped behind, then a fourth car hit the stopped third car. Damage totalled almost \$500.

Later around 2 p.m., a car driven by John Bloem of Guelph received \$200 damage in a skid near 7 Highway at the Seventh Line, Esquesing. That morning a collision near Norval on Highway 7 caused \$600 damage.
