Provincial School for the Deaf at Milton is expected to get underway school. That stage is estimated to cost more than \$5,000,000.

On Tuesday the Hon. Ray Connell, Minister, called tenders for the boilers for the power house of the school, and the contract is expected to be around \$75,000\$ to \$85,000 for this section. This is the first tender called.

Mr. Hall explained that stage one would include provision for classrooms, accommodation, administration and plant facilities to meet the province's current needs. When stages two and three are called in future years the total cost of the school is expected to top \$9,000,000.

The site chosen is on the former Kingdon Farm on highway 25. directly south of Halton Centennial Manor.
