Mr. E. D. Ryder is a patient in Guelph General Hospital where he underwent surgery this week. His many friends wish him a speedy recovery.

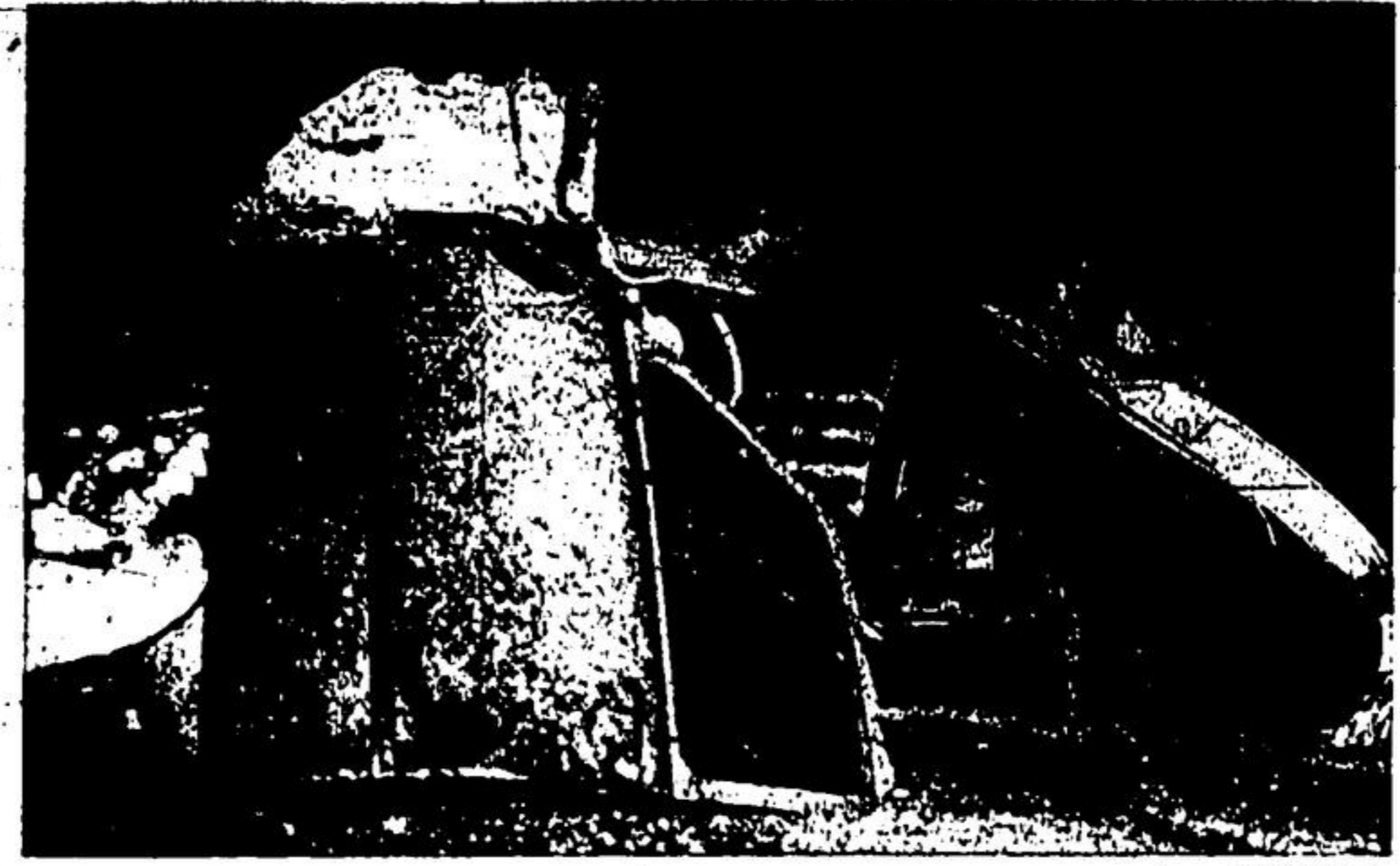

List Equipment
The following is a list of equipment your son will require for camp. Items marked x are not essential but may be taken.

Scout uniform, clasp knife x, compass x, flashlight x, waterproof matches x, tenderfoot to Queen's scout x, writing paper and envelopes x, 5c stamps x, spending money not to exceed \$2.
Note: first class scouts may carry sheath knives x.
Pack large enough to contain the following: sleeping bag or three woolen blankets, sleeping bag one blanket, ground sheet, knife, fork and spoon, plate, bowl and mug, pyjamas, two towels, toilet kit, change of underwear, change of stockings, handkerchiefs, T shirts, old shorts, swim trunks, sweater, jacket, waterproof coat, pencil and notebook, pair of jeans, running shoes, mending kit (thread, needles etc.).

Car Crashes Rock Embankment Hospitalize 2 Oakville Youths

Two Oakville youths were hospitalized and their 1950 car was completely wrecked early Saturday morning when the car crashed into an embankment on Highway 25 near Speyside, throwing out the driver and passenger.

Driver William Whitaker, 20, of 47 Wilson St., Oakville was taken to Milton District Hospital with a fractured neck, broken bone in the left foot, and lacerations and abrasions to the skull. He was transferred Tuesday evening to a Hamilton hospital. His passenger Murray Tuck, 21, of 50 Hawthorne Drive, Oakville, received a fractured left ankle, sprained right ankle and bruised back. He is still in Milton hospital.
