

English Young Farmer Member To Visit Halton on Exchange

Agricultural representative J. A. Francis has announced that this year, a member of the English Young Farmers' Association will visit Halton as part of an exchange visit. The delegate, Miss Anne Steele of Westmorland, will visit Halton between July 14 and 22.

The Halton Junior Farmers' Association will play host during Miss Steele's visit, while she will be a guest on two farms in the county.

The exchange program is part

of a continuing travelling scholarship sponsored by the Ontario Department of Agriculture and the Junior Farmers' Association of Ontario.

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Each year, four delegates from Ontario visit Great Britain, and

four delegates from England and four from Scotland visit Ontario. The program is arranged so that the delegates have an opportunity to visit in various areas of the country, and are able then to compare and exchange ideas on farming.

Miss Steele is from Heaven Farm, Levens, Kendal, Westmorland. She has been active in young farmer programs and assists on her father's farm, particularly in the poultry enterprise.

Films on Farming Taken in Halton

Ontario Hydro will be having a premiere showing on May 16 of the new film, "The Land is Mine". This was filmed in the Millton and Brampton areas, and tells the story of a city boy's summer on the farm of his aunt and uncle, and points out the changes in farming and farm life.

The production of this film is one of the features of the Ontario Sales Division of the Ontario Hydro. The manager, John Miles, along with regional supervisors, are instituting services to assist farm operators in the use of Hydro. Some of the services included in the program are spotting of problems in hydro use on the farm, and assisting in planning future programs that involve the use of electricity.

Ontario Agricultural College Plays Host to Halton Farmers

During 1960, Halton farmers were included in the 50,000 people who visited the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph. 65 agricultural conferences were held at the college during the year, representing every phase of the agricultural industry in the province.

In addition, there were numerous farmer field days and meetings, and a large number of individual farmers and small groups who came to seek information related to farm problems.

The doors of every department on the campus are always open to welcome the farmers of the province, and an increasing number each year are taking advantage of the services offered by the college.

With the swiftly changing pattern of agriculture, and the increasing need for special knowledge on the farm, there has been a need manifested for special information in specific areas, and college authorities have noted a definite change in the demands of the farmer since the day when he used to come to the college just to see what was going on.

ditional Farm and Home Week has now been replaced by numerous special days, when definite information can be given to interested farmers on special problems at a time of the year most suitable for demonstration. The farmer of today is demanding more technical information on all the various phases of his business, and the 15 departments at the O.A.C. are well equipped and eager to satisfy his demands.

College authorities emphasize that, although Farm and Home Week is being replaced by other types of field days and conferences to meet the desires of the farm public, the college will always welcome any farmer or group of farmers on a year-round basis.

Next time you plan a picnic, don't settle for the usual fare of sandwiches and soda pop. Make the meal a feast — and without any fuss or bother in the kitchen beforehand.

It's easy. The secret is to pick foods from your grocer's shelves or frozen food lockers that can be tucked right into the picnic basket and savored when you arrive at your open-air dining room.

Although the frozen foods defrost en route, you can buy a canned chemical freeze that'll keep them cold for hours.

Heat Over Grill
Start your feast with a frozen shrimp cocktail packed in its own tangy sauce. Frozen chicken a la king or beef stew can be heated over a fire or on an outdoor grill. Or the canned cold meats such as ham, tongue or chicken can be opened and sliced so that everyone can have his choice.

For dessert, you can have real strawberry shortcake without going near your oven. A store-bought cake, frozen strawberries and a pressure can of whipped cream provide the makings.

And there will be no battles between the black and light coffee cliques if you carry along a can of powdered coffee cream. It dissolves instantly in the cup of hot coffee you've poured from your vacuum bottle.

This is just a sampler. There are many, many more delicacies to choose from. Make your next picnic an outing to please a gourmet.

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The BIBLE Today

News has been received from the Congo that the Canadian Bible Society work is proceeding well even in the midst of the confused state of affairs which exists at the present time.

Since November, 1960, import licences have been readily granted for 300 cases of books and finger phones. The finger phones are small record players operated by turning the turntable with a finger and thus playing a recorded passage of scripture.

Shipped into Congo
The Rev. A. W. Mathison, the Bible Society secretary in the area, reports that not only have large quantities of Bibles and New Testaments been received from London and New York, but that he has been able to dispatch shipments to many parts of the Congo. New supplies cannot be sent into the Oriental and Kivu provinces but the book stores there have a good stock of God's word on hand.

Thirty thousand Tshibusu Gospels of St. John have been printed at the Leo Press. These will be used for distribution among the refugees in the Bakwanga area. A shipment of between 500 and 600 Tshibusu Bibles has been dispatched to the same area. A Volkswagen bus will soon be in service selling scriptures in this part of the country.
