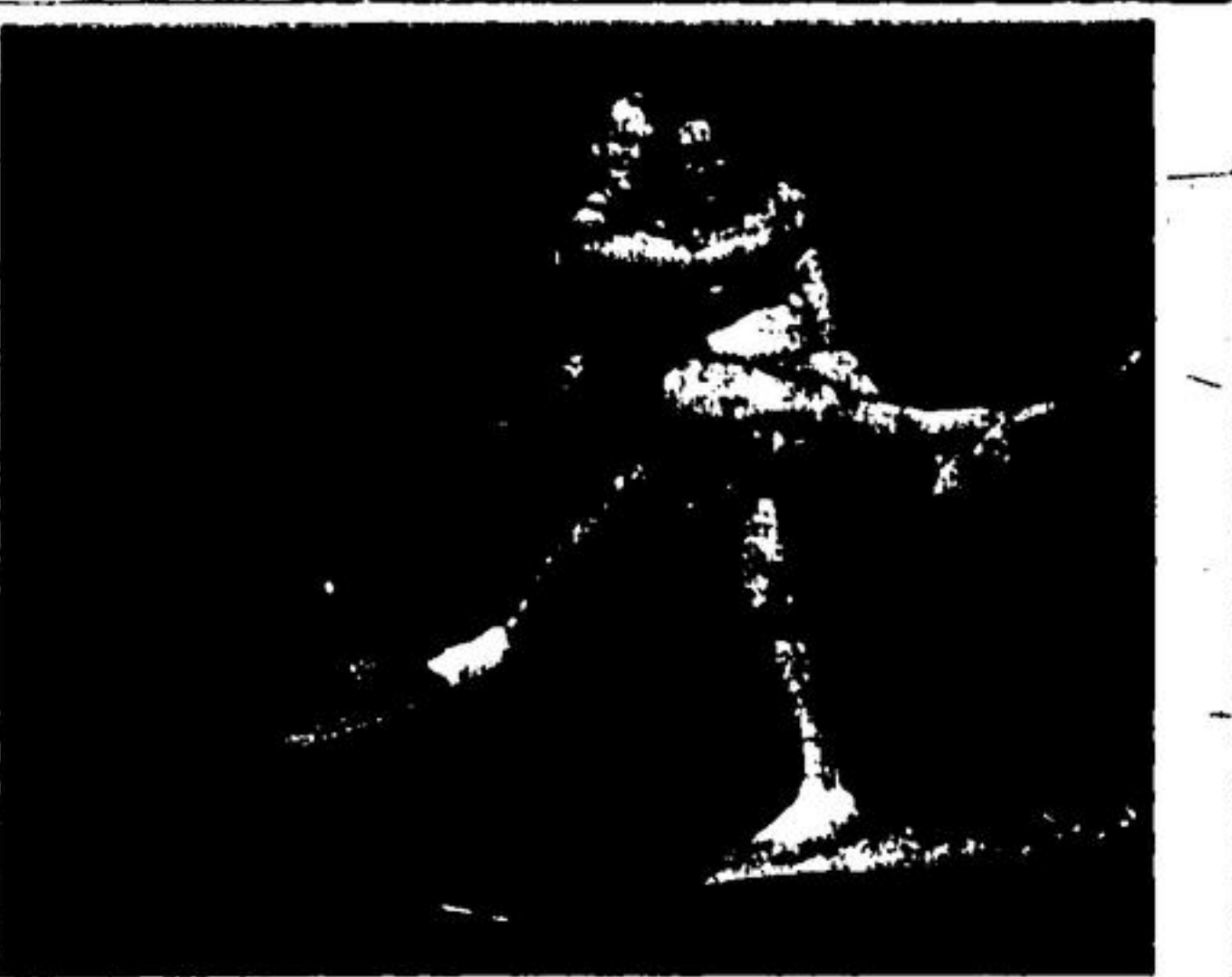
Different business was dealt with. After the meeting was closed the hostess and committee served a dainty lunch.
