

### Rev. H. B. Stokreef Named Rector Of St. James Church, Hamilton

The Rev. H. B. Stokreef has been appointed rector of the Church of St. James the Apostle in Hamilton. The announcement was made in a letter read at the morning services Sunday. The appointment commences August 1. The letter was read simultaneously at the Church of St. James the Apostle and at the Church of St. Alban the Martyr here. In his letter the Bishop of Niagara, the Right Rev. W. E. Bagnall, D.D., D.C.L., wrote: "I know every member of the congregation of St. Alban's will be sorry to lose a faithful and devoted pastor but I know too that you will all join me in praying that God will bless and prosper him in his new and tremendous work in the east end of Hamilton. The Church of St. James the Apostle is one of the largest congregations in the diocese of Niagara and will call for all the physical strength and spiritual dedication of the rector."

The meeting was closed with a hymn and prayer. Mrs. Ironside was in charge of the talent table where everything was sold quickly. Tea was served.

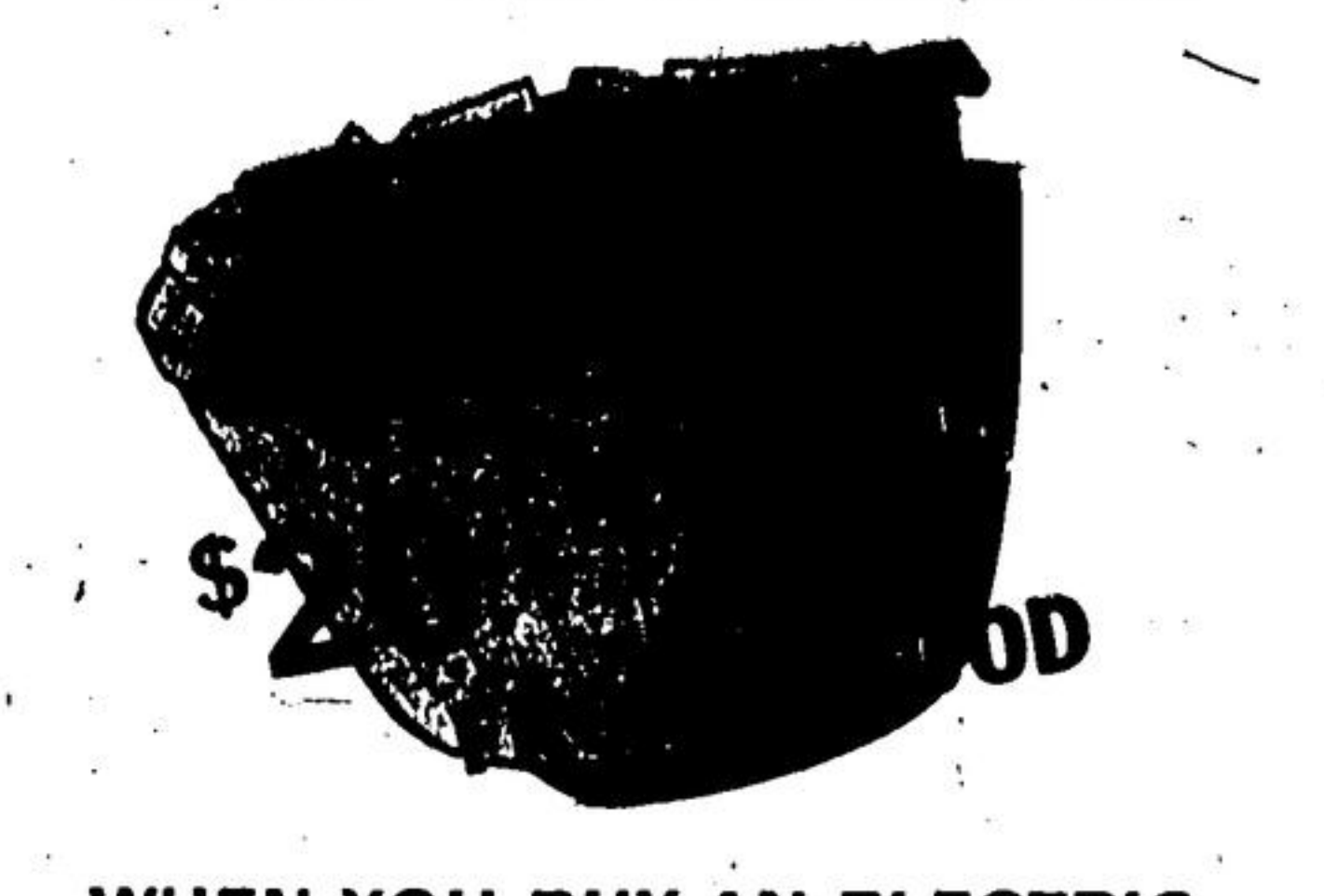
### White Brick
