The attractive and gay costumes represented work by performers' parents under the supervision of Mrs. Robert Martingell.

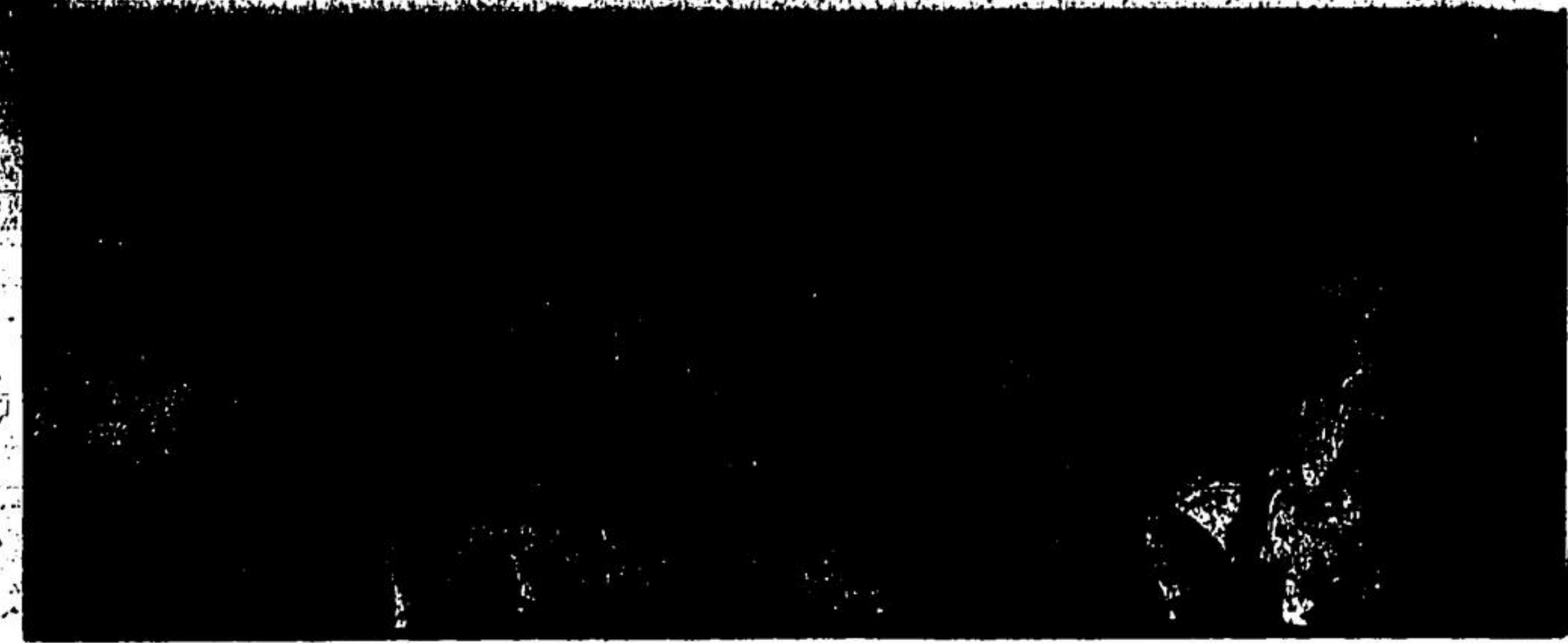

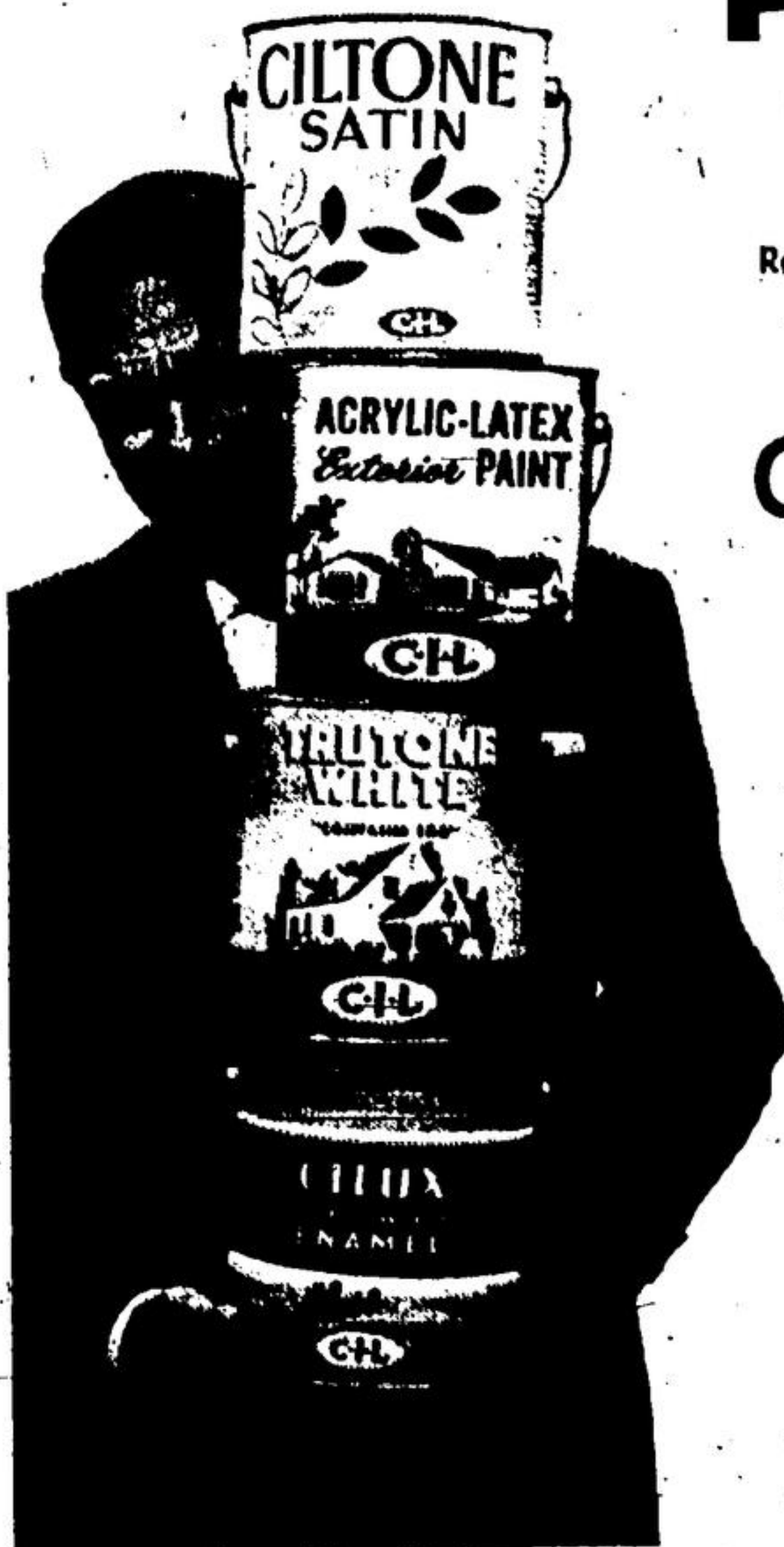
