With the Acton Boy Scouts

No doubt your son has stated that he is in the Fox Patrol, Cougar Patrol etc., and you may wonder what this patrol system is all about.

It is, basically, turning the universal gang instinct of early adolescence to good purpose. For boys of the age of scouting tend to go around in small hero-worshipping groups, with one of them, because of some quickness of mind, brightness of personality, inventiveness of occupations or merely some muscular or bodily advantage, as the recognized hero-leader.

It was these groups and these leaders for whom Baden Powell (founder of scouting) cast his lure; for to persuade the leader to follow the path of good—the path of scouting—and his companions will follow him. B. P. saw the boy-leader as missionary, instructor and the rocks on which the scout movement could be built.

Leader Has Initiative
And in the beginning, that was how it was. The boy with the initiative got hold of his willing "patrol" and became a P.L. His pal (or perhaps his most obvious rival) became "Corporal" or as we have it nowadays, "Second". And scouting was born! The present day patrol numbers not less than four and not more than eight "scouts".

The selection of his patrol is normally the choice of the individual boy upon joining the "troop". However, his decision is subject to the agreement of the patrol and the court of honor.

If the patrol does not wish to accept him, already has eight boys on the court of honor does not agree to his placing, then some frank discussions with the scoutmaster must take place and the most acceptable solution must be found for both the boy and the troop.

Not Exclusive Club
While every troop has the right to refuse admittance to any boy, this right is not invoked

nearly on the grounds of unpopularity. A scout troop or patrol is NOT an exclusive club. If, later, a boy finds he has made a mistake in his choice of patrol, he is given the opportunity to change.

The creation of a good patrol depends very much on the example set by the P.L. and his second, and the extent to which they encourage the participation of each member in the affairs of the patrol.

Food is a very important part of camping. The success of a camp depends a great deal on the meals. Certainly if they are poor, the camp will hold unpleasant memories. Good food and regular meals are important factors in good health and developing a fit body.

If you are not familiar with the preparation of salads, the following recipe will add a little taste to the salads you will be required to prepare at camp.

Bolled Salad Dressing
1 qt. milk
3 ozs. flour
1 1/2 ozs. mustard
3 1/2 ozs. sugar
4 oz. salt
4 eggs
1 1/2 cups vinegar
3 ozs. butter
(1) Heat 2/3 of milk over slow heat.
(2) Mix dry ingredients thoroughly. Add remaining milk and mix to a smooth paste.
(3) Add gradually to heated milk. Stir constantly until thickened.
(4) Cook, stirring occasionally, until no flavor of raw starch remains (10 to 15 mins.).
(5) Beat eggs. Add a small portion of hot dressing to eggs and combine thoroughly.
(6) Stir into hot mixture and cook 2 to 3 minutes.
(7) Remove from heat. Add butter. Cool slightly and stir in vinegar.
(8) Cover and chill thoroughly before using.
Yield: approximately 1 1/2 quarts.

Fire Bureau to Award Plaques During Fire Prevention Week

Plans for the fall fire prevention program in Halton's elementary schools are now being formulated by the county's fire prevention bureau, and one innovation of this year's proposed program will be the awarding of plaques to the top classroom in each municipality.

During the October fire prevention week, the fire brigades in each Halton municipality plan to hold open houses and the classrooms bringing the highest percentage attendance of children and parents will win a beautiful trophy for their school. Earlier in the school term, the children will receive home fire hazard checklists and these will be filled in by the parents and returned to the fire brigades at the open houses.

Plaques Give Interest.
Awards to the top classrooms will be presented at the annual fire prevention dinner. "We feel these plaques will be a big incentive in getting the parents and children interested in the great need of fire prevention in the home," said Alf Peacock of Burlington, who is organizing the program for the bureau. More final details of the local contests are yet to be formulated.

At a meeting last week, the bureau heard County Mutual Aid Co-ordinator Douglas Wilson, chief of the Oakville brigade, explain several courses and speaking engagements that he and other Halton firefighters have attended. He told members that Halton's fire prevention bureau has gained acclaim across the province, and several other counties have asked for information on setting up similar bureaus.
