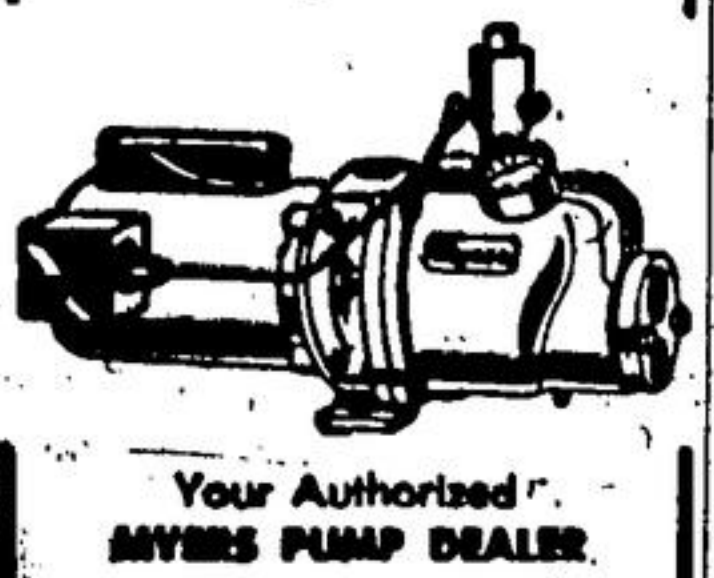
Ed Griswold and Larry Coulson are assisting the two teams this year.
