Parks Board Seeks to Ensure Agricultural Society's Rights

During a special meeting of Acton Board of Parks Management, Thursday, May 25, members held an open discussion on ways and means of assuring the Acton Agricultural Society use of the park and their buildings there (used for fair poultry exhibits) during the annual Fall Fair.

A preliminary by-law was presented for discussion and pending approval of the draft by-law by the Fair Board, a final by-law will be presented. This action took place following a previous enquiry by Mayor John H. Goy to have the situation clarified.

During the special meeting, members were in accord to grant the Fair Board permission for use of the park facilities as suggested but hesitated to allow other than meetings and fall fair activities to take place in the building without the special consent of the parks board.

After further study of the proposed by-law, a final draft will be made and reviewed before approval is given.

Consent was given during the meeting to allow horse drawn vehicles use of the race track from November 1 to May 1 and curtail all motor traffic during this time.

Arrangements were made to have a sample picnic table available for the next meeting. Board members agreed to endorse a service charge for picnic tables on Sundays at the rate of 50 cents apiece. Proceeds would be used to purchase additional tables.

White-Black Barriers Must Go, Nigerian Says

The second in the series of three ecumenical missionary services sponsored by the ministerial association was held Sunday evening at Knox Presbyterian Church. A Nigerian evangelist, the Rev. Inya Ide declared the whole of Africa must be made one for Christ. He stressed conditions in Nigeria as he told of the problems of all of Africa.

Taking part in the service were the first minister the Rev. A. H. McKenzie, the Rev. Douglas Engel of Acton United Church and the Baptist pastor, James Rudd.

In charge of a group of Presbyterians in his native country, Mr. Ide came to Canada a year ago to take a course in general acts at the University of Toronto. Nigeria, which became independent in 1960, was grateful for British rule, he said. Thanks to the British the Nigerians did not suffer as much as other Africans, he claimed. While missionaries were dedicated to helping the Africans, they were followed by others who exploited them. This bred so much bitterness that there has even developed a lack of confidence in the churches. This poses enormous problems for the churches.

The outlook is worse in other parts of Africa than in Nigeria where, although Christians are only 2 per cent of the population, they are in many posts of responsibility.

He warned that, because the world is growing smaller, "we cannot go on eternally discriminating. The barriers between white and black races must be broken down."

The series of three services for congregations of the Protestant and Anglican churches began in January when Dr. Forrest spoke at the United Church. The third service will be in the fall.
