Elizabeth Force, 17, a member of the Guelph College Figure Skating Club and one of the keen skaters of the Guelph Summer Skating Club directed by Ross Smith, won the coveted Canadian-Figure Skating Association Gold Medal in Figures and Free Skating, passing the Eighth Test.

The C.F.S.A. tests were held on Sunday at the skating school in the Guelph Curling Club arena. Miss Force is the only skater in Ontario to gain the Gold Medal this spring, with completion of tests in the Guelph and four Toronto skating schools.

Honor Graduate Elizabeth is an honor graduate of grade 12 at Acton District High School and has been Figure Skating since she was 10 years old in the Guelph College-Figure Skating Club.

All of her training from the start through the Preliminary (kindergarten) test to the Eighth has been with Ross Smith. She has taken instruction this past winter from Judy Lawton, a Goodwinham of Toronto, also an instructor at the Guelph Club.

Elizabeth is the first skater ever to become a Gold Medalist with a Guelph and district club.
