# Disciples of Christ Convention Centenary at Everton Coincide

The Church of Christ Disciples at Everton has been the setting for the Annual Convention of the Disciples of Christ in Ontario, with members and delegates present from most of the Churches across Ontario. This was of double significance as not only was it completing the 118th year of co-operation but was also the 100th anniversary of the Everton Church.

Registration began Thursday afternoon, followed by devotions by R. J. Pelham. Reports had been prepared in book form and a panel presentation of these was conducted by Rev. W. M. Kennedy of St. Thomas with the following panel — O. W. McCully, Otto Moore, Miss Joan Ledger, Mrs. W. M. Kennedy, Mrs. B. McKinlay, Mrs. Victor Beachin, Mrs. D. G. Robertson.

**Convention Theme** — "Jesus, Christ with the Light of the World" and the various leaders and speakers centered their messages around the theme. Wm. O. Baker, minister of Park Ave. St. Thomas, gave the theme address.

Supper was served in the Sunday School room by ladies of the Christian Women's Fellowship.

The evening service was the Centenary Service and many gathered to participate in this anniversary.

With the minister Byron F. Howlett presiding and Miss Marilyn Kingsbury at the organ and James Thompson of Guelph at the piano a lively sing song was enjoyed. Devotions were given by Rev. Wm. G. Kitchen of Guelph.

Wm. Stewart, chairman of the Church board, extended a hearty welcome and greetings were brought by Hon. John Root, member of Parliament for North Wellington and Dufferin, and Harry Worton, member of Guelph.

**Historical Sketch** — Miss Lois Black of Elora and a former member of the Church gave an interesting historical sketch "Everton—Yesterday and Today." Miss Black's nephew, Keith Black of Acton accompanied by Glenn Banks sang a solo "How Great Thou Art."

Rev. Hugh B. Kilgour, of Toronto, retired minister and missionary, delivered the Centennial address, leaving with all fine impressions of the past and hopes for the future.

**Friday's Sessions** — With W. H. Luton of St. Thomas, vice president of the Ontario board, presiding, Friday's sessions commenced with devotions by B. J. Herring, pastor of Windmill Point. The main address "Rural Churches in the Decade of Decision" was given by Dale W. Madearis of Indianapolis, who is associate executive secretary of Department of Church development of United Christian Missionary Society.

The noon luncheon served in the Stone United Church was presided over by D. J. Bailey, pastor at Winger and chairman of the committee on Christian Unity. "Jesus Christ the Light of Canada" was the subject of an inspiring address by O. W. McCully, Toronto.

Friday afternoon is known as Women's Day and Mrs. D. G. Robertson, president of Ontario Christian Women's Fellowship presided. Devotions were by Mrs. D. Stephens and Mrs. Tryon of Glencairn. The address "Jesus Christ the Light of Women" was given by Mrs. Clayton D. Weeks, missionary on furlough from the Republic of the Congo (formerly the Belgian Congo).

While the women had their business session, the men adjourned to hear a lecture by Dale W. Madearis.

Saturday morning was given over to convention business and the luncheon was served in Oxbridge Presbyterian Church, with Elmer J. Stanton, minister at Windsor, presiding. Miss Joan Ledger, Toronto, spoke on "Jesus Christ the Light of Education."

**Young People's Challenge** — Ontario Christian Youth Fellowship sessions were held Saturday afternoon with the president, Miss Donna Kingsbury presiding. The theme "Jesus Christ the Light of Youth" by Dale W. Madearis challenged the young people in their thinking and actions.

At the youth banquet Mrs. Clayton D. Weeks directed her remarks to young people, stressing the stand to take by Christian youth as they enter into a troubled world.

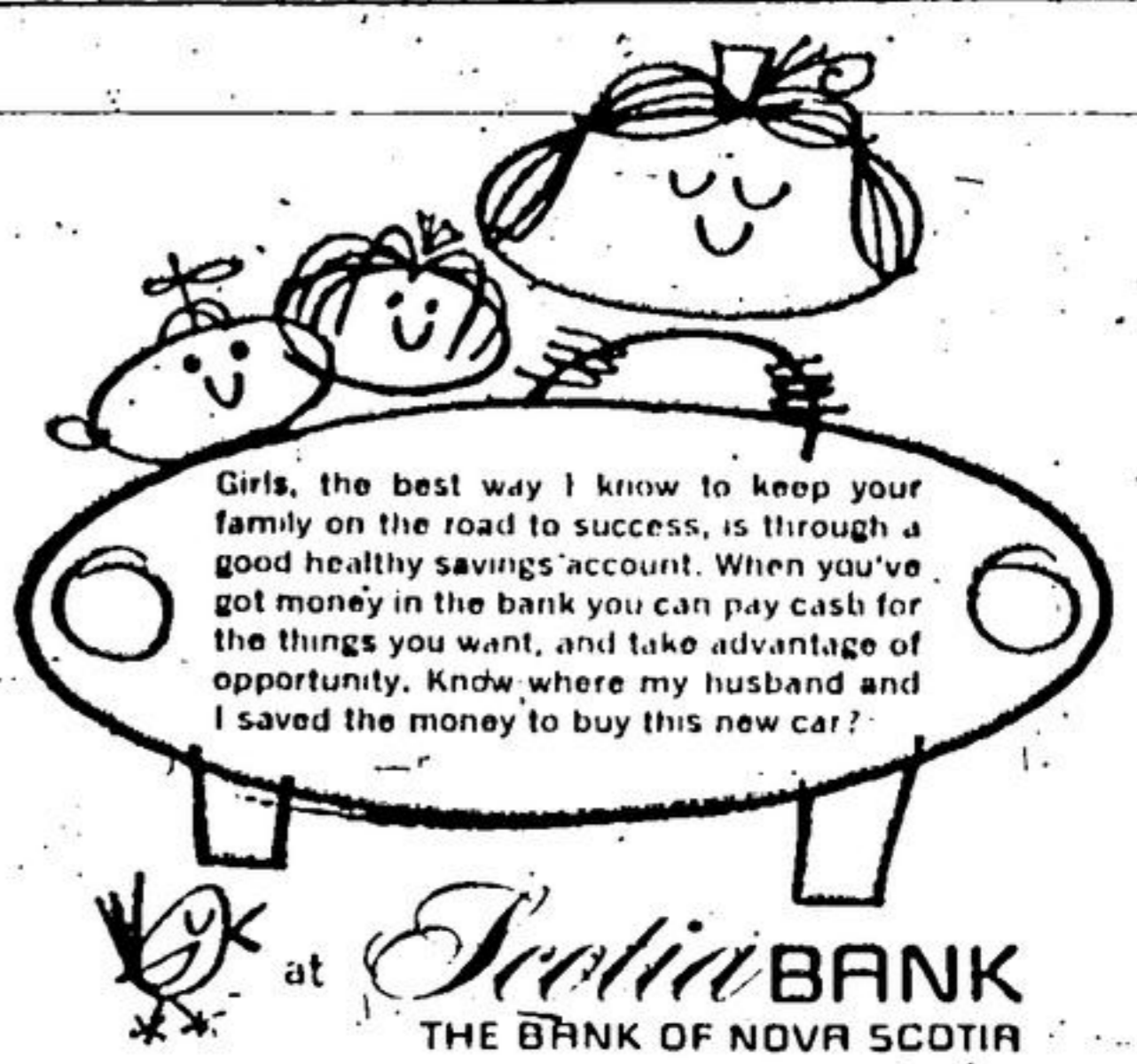
Young People served refreshments complete with a birthday cake for Mr. Howlett, their adult advisor, whose birthday was on Sunday.
