

## Halton Candidates Speak At Acton Liberal Rally

Conservative government for allocating a portion of its \$6,000,000 civil defense budget to provide bunkers for cabinet members. If awarded the nomination Mr. Mutzak promised to serve Halton County with honesty and with integrity which in his estimation should be the qualities for a good politician.

Cy Young, Oakville radio news editor, forecast under a Liberal regime "Canada would recapture the enviable position lost in the past few years." He told his audience that under the Liberal government Canada enjoyed some good years but since the reign of the Conservatives, Canada has not experienced the same measure of affluence and prosperity.

In stressing the Avro layoff, Mr. Young stated it was not necessarily a bad decision and said the Liberals had been warned earlier the Avro might be obsolete before it became fully operational.

**Three Hours Notice**  
He explained however the Conservatives had exercised extreme callousness when only three hours' notice was given to some

1,400 employees they would be out of a job.

He advocated a properly planned immigration program as a cure for trade ills by an increase in population.

Harry Pollard, a Liberal since 1948 when he began his interest in England, criticized Halton federal representative Sandy Best when he noted he was a likeable fellow and had done nothing wrong during his term of office. "In fact, he has done nothing—period; he is just a rubber stamp to be picked up and dropped at will. This is why he must be defeated."

**Competition Myth**  
Mr. Pollard reminded the audience that world trade was a two-way street and labelled Japanese competition a myth, claiming cheap imitations of radio parts from Japan has enabled one Canadian firm to monopolize the transistor radio market.

He denounced the present government policy of imposing tariffs to reduce unemployment as he stated this arrangement would not decrease unemployment.

An informal question and answer period followed the meeting chaired by Roy Goodwin in the absence of president Peter Papillon.

During the trip they toured Fort York, High Park, the museum and zoo. They supplied their own lunch for noon hour and were home for dinner.

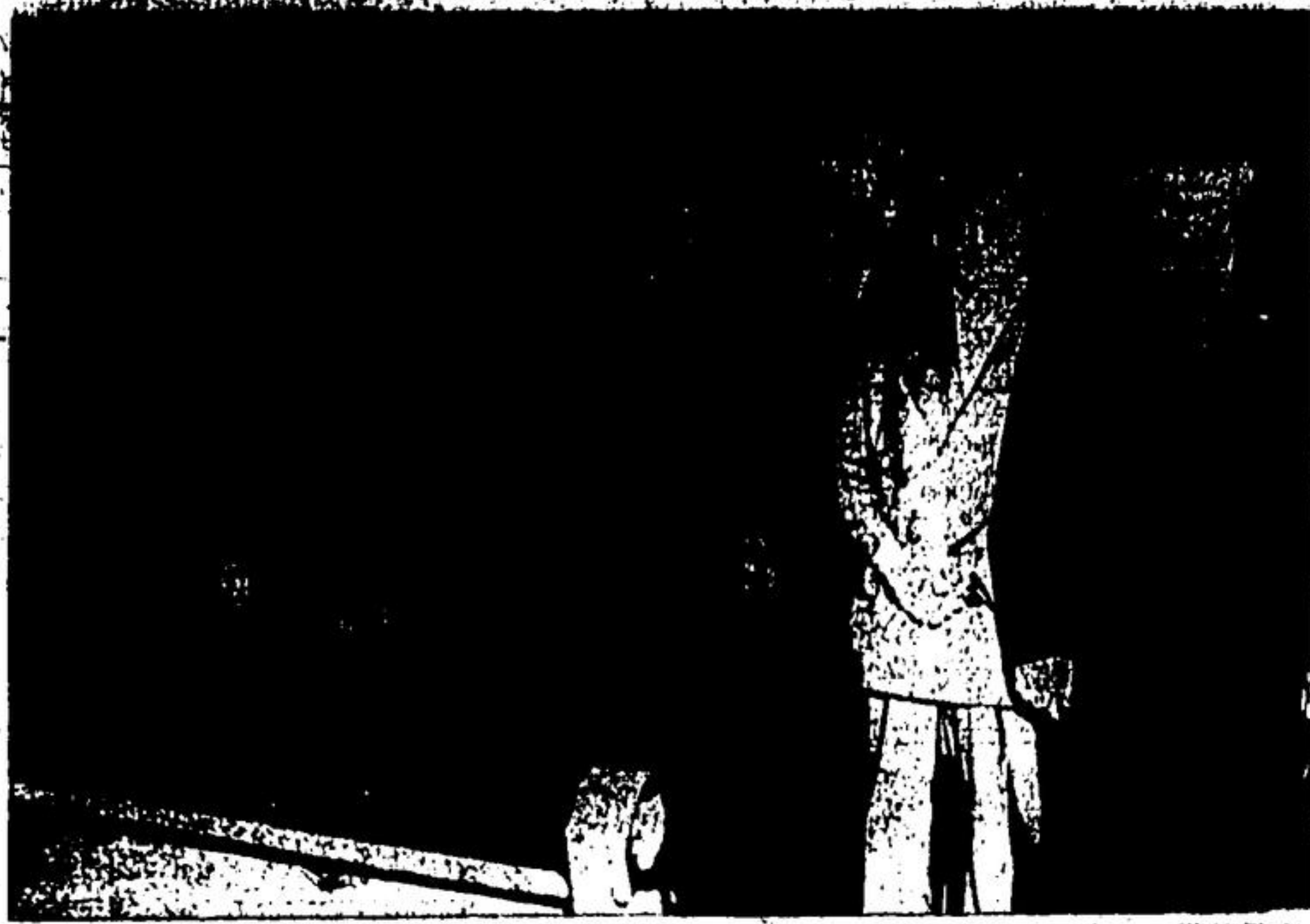
## 45th Anniversary For Mr. & Mrs. Coles
