

## Penalties Pose Problems Signers Withdraw Names

After being warned of penalties imposed if properties were rezoned from residential to commercial, ratemayers signing a petition requesting operation of a beauty salon, withdrew their names during a Planning Board hearing, Thursday, June 15.

Mrs. Harvey Lambert presented the petition during an earlier board meeting after she had been refused a permit to operate a beauty salon. The permit was refused because of residential zoning in the Guelph Street West area on No. 7 Highway.

**Renovations Illegal**  
During the special hearing with the ratemayers affected, planning consultant P. Alan Deacon warned them that if the zone was changed, their property would be registered as a non-conforming use and any alterations or renovations would be illegal. He also warned if fire destroyed their homes, they would be unable to rebuild if the zoning was changed to commercial use.

Jack McMullen, present with the delegation, asked why commercial properties in the downtown area were allowed to expand. He was told they had been established before the zoning by-law came into effect. Mr. Deacon explained the by-law was not to penalize existing places but to protect residents regarding future growth.

**Ask Separate Consideration**  
Mr. McMullen informed the board the reason the petition had been signed was to allow Mrs. Lambert to operate a hair-dressing salon in her home. He enquired if it was possible to deal with this request separately.

He suggested that consideration might be given to allow the use of the Lambert home for a beauty salon providing the neighbours did not object, but if the property or business was sold, some measure of control could be provided.

Chairman R. H. Elliott informed the group the petition had requested rezoning the entire area. Mr. McMullen enquired if it was not possible to have one property rezoned. He was told the planning consultant the planning board could hold a public meeting to obtain approval of the residents in the area and then make a recommendation to council.

**Spot Rezoning Shunned**  
He pointed out, however, that final approval would have to be given by the Ontario Municipal Board and that in the past they had turned down spot zoning.

Mr. McMullen suggested the area in question was presently situated in a commercial area, noting it was divided from a garage by one residential property. Jack Creasey, one of the petition signers, asked if everyone withdrew their names, could the

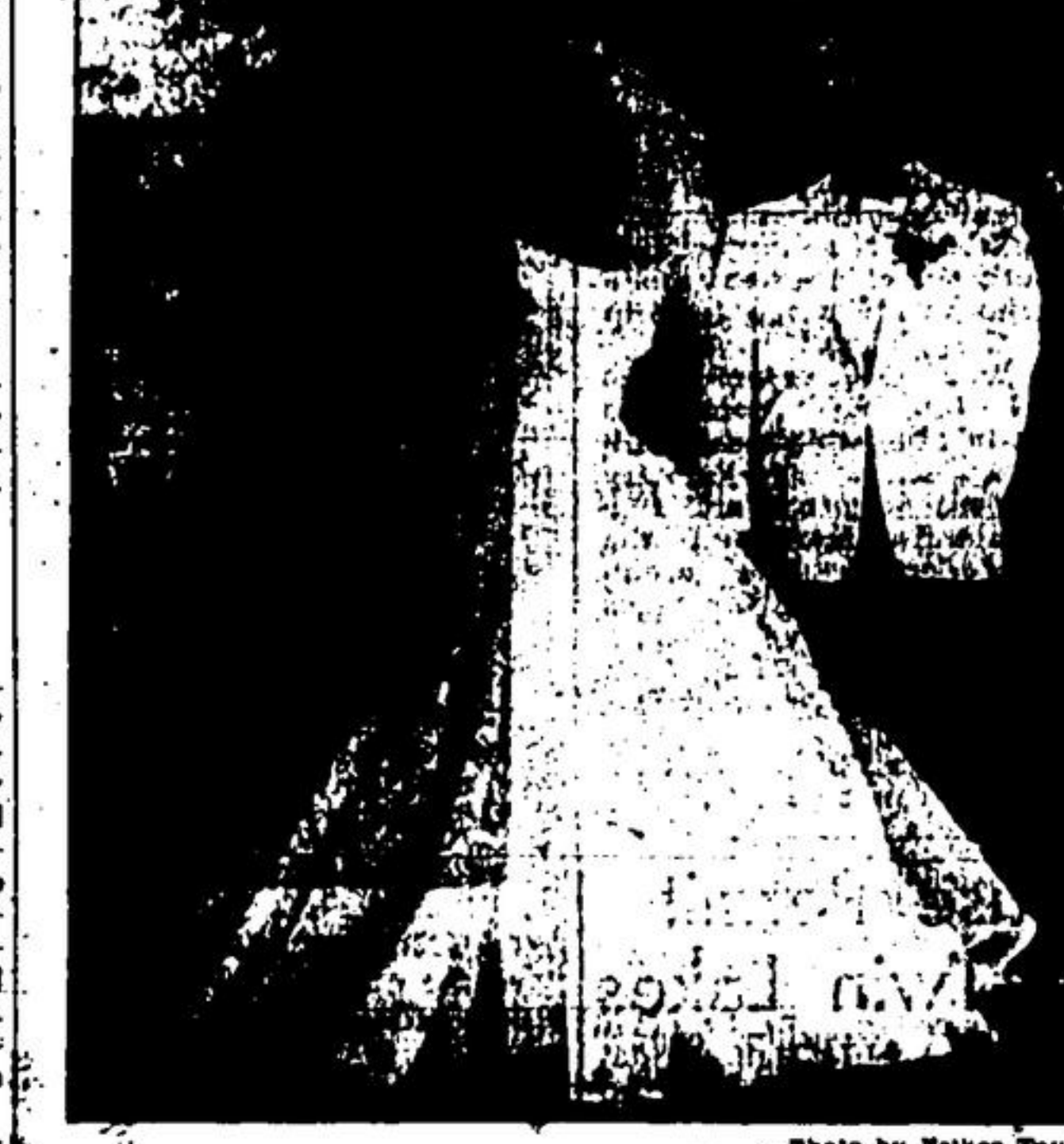
Other churches and organizations sought some of the furnishings. Ken Allen was in charge of the sale. Bids for demolition have not yet been sought.
