For All-Star Game Pick Cream of Halton Crop

Five members of the Champion Campbellville Merchants are amid the Halton County all-star team lineup which will take to the field Sunday July 9 against Galt Terriers. The occasion will be the league's fifth annual all-star game and it will be played in Campbellville this year.

Jack Roberts, a veteran left hander in the Campbellville lineup and Gary Field, another left hander with the village squad who is in his first full season with Campbellville after a tenure with Guelph Merchants in the Intercountry Senior league, along with Lyn McLaren who is the mainstay of the rookie Georgetown entry are the trio who were chosen tops in the league.

Added to this pair of Campbellville pitchers are first snacker Earl Cairns and another infielder, Stan Henderson who will hold down his newest position at third base. Henderson has played at every position with the club but this year is making a regular turn at third base and was chosen best at it by the seven team managers in the ballot system.

For a good number of years with his seemingly easy shoestring catches with a long right arm. Alongside this pair will be Pete Kennedy of Oakville Oaks, a former Miltonian who has played most of his baseball in the motor city and is a real powerhouse at bat. Kennedy will be in the schoolhouse side of the outfield for the big game at Campbellville.

What would seem to be a natural thing is the choice of Len Andrews, the Campbellville Merchants' firey mentor, as the all-star team manager. This was voted on by the managers themselves, making Andrews a unanimous choice. His aides will be Art McLanson, Milton, Red Sox first-year full-time pilot, and Dude Lindsay of Acton Merchants who has guided the tannery town club for the past five seasons.

For the opposition Galt Terriers, yet undefeated in six home starts in the Intercountry Senior baseball league, will be on hand and they boast an armful of U.S. baseball stars who dot the Terrier lineup.

Game time for the annual tilt is set for 2:30 p.m. and will be played after some pre-game ceremonies on behalf of the league executive.

Choose Wingo

What will likely be almost as tough a battery as they would come up against in the Intercountry league will be provided in the all-star game with Alan Wingo, the youthful backstop for Campbellville as the top selection here. Wingo has played all his baseball for Campbellville as has Earl Cairns the first base choice, and in the past two years the sharp receiver has had a number of offers from Intercountry clubs who would like to use his services.

At second base is Len Coolich of Oakville Oaks, a former softballer who made a switch to baseball two years ago. He won

out over such top men as Milton's Ron Shannon and Dundas' Mario Sobben.

The shortstop slot goes to Stu Hannant of Milton Red Sox who although he has played as many games at third as he has at short, gained the most votes in a close battle with Campbellville's sharp Elmer Dredge and Oakville's Ross Dryden.

Outfield Strong

The outfield is split between three different teams and boasts some power hitters as well as good throwing arms, making their choice a natural.

Jim Wilson, an addition to the Dundas club this year, was a top candidate and he also boasts some Intercountry experience. He will toil in the left field position alongside centrefielder Bob Bruce, one of the most underrated players in the game who has been Acton's mainstay in the outfield
