Council Eliminates Confusion Renames Unconnected Roads

Council Tuesday evening eliminated a source of much confusion on street names. By renaming sections of unconnected streets, all of which had the same street names, it should now be possible to locate homes much easier. The new street names were chosen from a list of hundreds supplied by public school children and selected by the administration committee.

The by-law to officially change the names will be prepared, presented to Council, and then to the County Court judge who will then issue a Court order making it all official. Bower Street, will be made three streets. From Main to Willow it will be St. Alban's Drive; from Willow to the C.N.R. tracks and Mill St. it will be Bower St.; from the C.N.R. track to Wallace Avenue it will be Perth St. Queen Street will be No. 7 highway on the east side of the town to Young St. at Ajax Engineers. From Main St. to the West end of town it will be Cobble Hill Drive. Agnes Street from Mason Knit to Maria Street will be known as York St. Guelph Street from Mill Street, past Force Electric and Mason Knit, over the C.N.R. track to Queen Street will become East-ern Avenue. Guelph Street on the Crescent will become Poplar Ave. Blackham Street in Lakowick Subdivision will become an extension of Elmore Dr.

Two Oakville residents received head and face lacerations and required hospital treatment following an accident near Speyside, early Sunday morning.

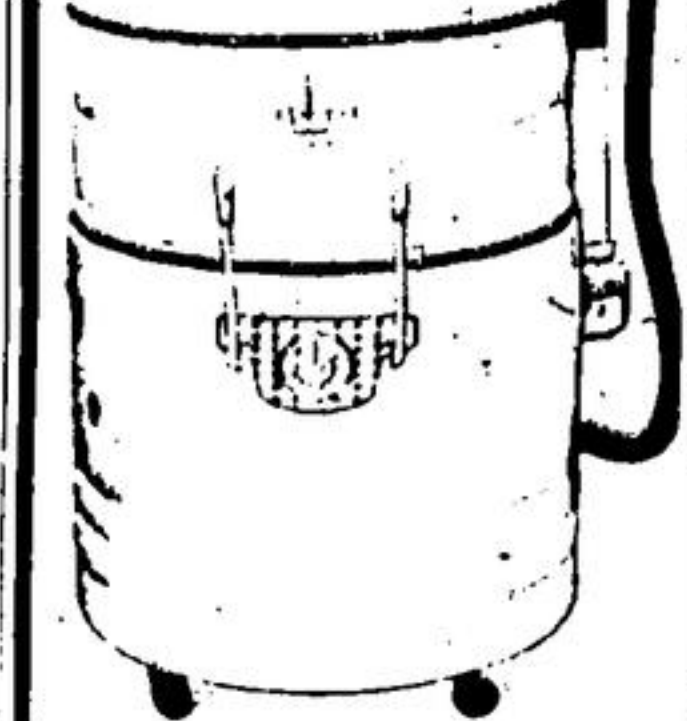
