

Snap at Anything When this happens, the fish forget their Assual caution. They will come into the shallows and snap up anything that looks good - and this includes your bait or artificial lures.

The important thing is timing -being in the right place at the right time. Before going lishing, check the local weather forecast. If a cold front is due, get out your gear and head foryour favorite fishing spot.

One precaution: take along a raincoat. You may find things a bit damp. But as far as the fishing goes, it will be worth it.
