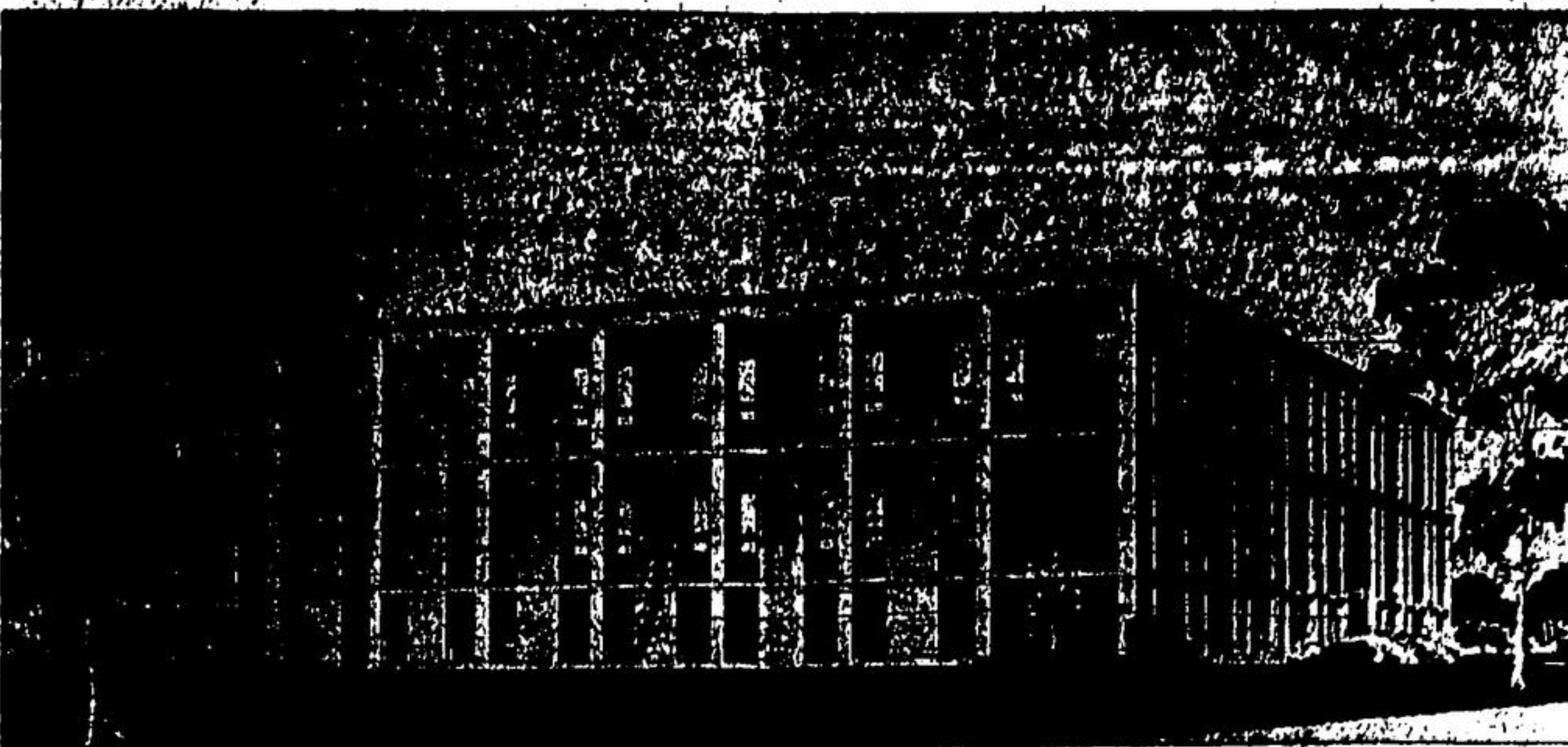

## Halton's New Administration Building County Okays \$924,691 Administration Building

### Total Cost to Reach \$1,045,000 May Finance Through Taxation

Approval was given Friday for Halton's new court house, registry office and office administration building, estimated, \$924,691 structure that when furnished and landscaped will cost approximately \$1,045,000. The building plans approved by County Council at Friday's June meeting show a cheaper, less glamorous building than the original structure that was proposed at a cost of \$1,300,000.

If the Municipal Board will okay the idea, Halton may possibly finance the building on a "pay-as-you-go" basis by levying an extra mill on general taxes for the next few years.

And if the construction is eligible for government grants, it could be partly erected under a winter works scheme next winter.

Reeve F. I. Ryckman of Burlington, who proposed that the county pay for the building over the next few years by an extra mill on the tax rate, warned the cost of the administration building would be doubled if the cost was debentured. Halton's debenture debt is already \$3,342,495. Deputy-Reeve H. H. Hinton of Acton agreed, but clerk Garfield Brown said treasurer Miss M.
