Application forms for ONTARIO RETAIL SALES TAX VENDOR'S PERMIT should be returned by July 15, 1961

Official Permit Application Forms have been sent to over 120,000 Ontario vendors together with detailed information on the new Ontario Retail Sales Tax Act. These applications should be completed and returned by July 15th, so that vendors will receive their permits and additional information well in advance of September 1st, when the tax goes into effect.

Who requires a vendor's permit? Every company or person, who in the ordinary course of his business sells goods to purchasers in Ontario, must have a sales tax vendor's permit. Restaurants and other premises selling prepared meals require a permit. Permits are also required by salesmen or manufacturer's agents who sell in Ontario for non-resident vendors not registered in Ontario.

Vendors who have not received official Permit Application forms should send for one today!
