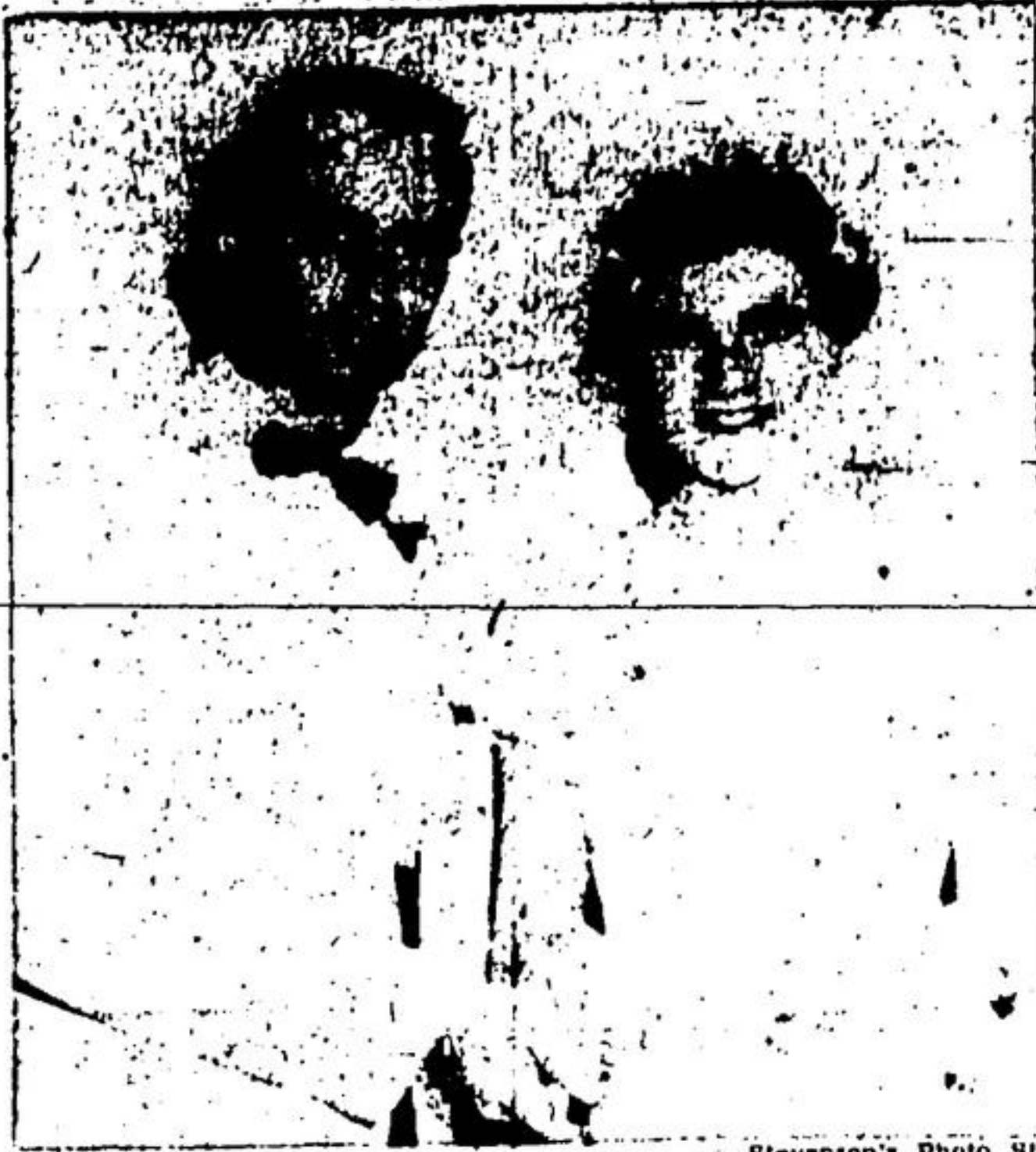

RASPBERRY AND RHUBARB JELLY

Yield: about 12 medium glasses (8 lbs. jelly)

4 cups juice (about 1 quart ripe red raspberries and 2 1/2 lbs. rhubarb)

7 cups (3 lbs.) sugar, 1 bottle Certo fruit pectin

First, prepare the juice. Crush about 1 quart fully ripe red raspberries. Cut in 1-inch pieces (do not peel) about 2 1/2 pounds rhubarb. Place fruits in jelly cloth or bag and squeeze out juice. Measure 4 cups into a very large saucepan.

Then make the jelly. Add sugar to juice in saucepan and mix well. Place over high heat and bring to a boil, stirring constantly. At once stir in Certo. Then bring to a full rolling boil and boil hard 1 minute, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, skim off foam with metal spoon, and pour quickly into glasses. Cover jelly at once with 1/2 inch hot paraffin.
