

800 Fans Watch

All-Stars Shellack Galt 13-9

The Annual Halton County all-star game was a howling success as a large crowd of approximately 800 fans on a beautiful Sunday afternoon, watched the best in Halton County humble the powerful Galt Terriers by a score of 13-9.

Galt, featuring six Americans in their lineup, was never really in the game as the all-star jumped to an early lead that they never relinquished.

Use Three Hurlers
Garry Field of Campbellville started for the all-stars and worked four innings, allowing two runs off five hits. He walked two and struck out one. Bob Burroughs of Dundas worked the next three, allowing six runs off four hits. He walked three and struck out one. Jack Roberts of Campbellville, in the final two innings allowed one run off two innings. He struck out two. Jack McNeil went four and one third innings for Galt. Jack

Hay worked two and two-thirds and Nellie Cooper hurled the final frame. Between them they allowed 13 runs off 13 hits and their teammates committed a surprising six errors. The all-stars had only one error but it was costly as it came with two out and resulted in five unearned runs for Galt.

First Batter Homers
The first batter of the game, Wayne Edwards, the short stop, dropped a home run over the left field fence to give Galt a short-lived 1-0 lead.

To open the bottom of the first Len Coplich of Oakville got to second on a two base throwing error by the Galt short stop, Stu Hannant of Milton singled, Coplich home and went to third on Al Wingrove's single. Campbellville's first baseman, Earl Cairns, then screamed a home-run over the right field fence to give the all-stars a 4-1 lead. Stan Henderson, Campbellville's third

baseball then singled, went to second when Pete Kennedy of Oakville singled to third on an infield out and scored when Jack Laking of Campbellville singled. This gave the all-stars a 5-1 lead at the bottom of the first.

Five Run Inning
In the bottom of the third, the all-stars had another big five run inning to make it 10-1. Kennedy was on second by virtue of an error when Bob Bruce of Acton doubled him home. Garry Field's single scored Bruce, and then another error and consecutive doubles off the bats of Hannant and Wingrove produced three more tallies.

In the top of the fourth Boomer doubled and scored on McNeil's single to make it 10-2 for the all-stars. The top of the fifth was Galt's big inning when they scored five times off Bob Barrow. The first batter walked but was out stealing. The second batter walked but was forced at

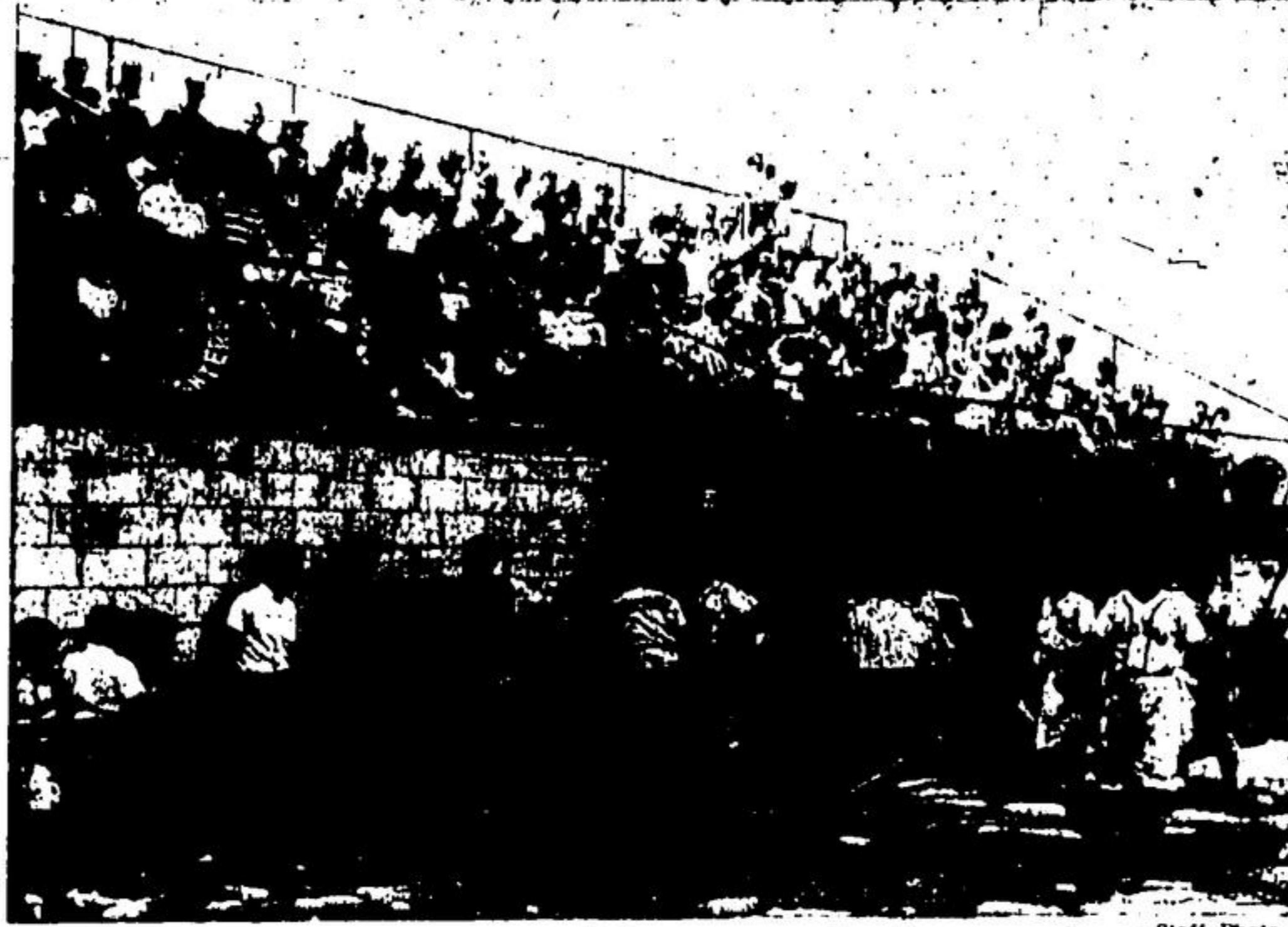
second for the second out. Hannant then erred on a grounder and Boomer singled to end the bases. Jim Purrell then unloaded a four run home-run and Frank McMurrin followed with another homer to make it 10-7 for the all-stars.

More Homers
Two errors followed by singles by Coolich and Wingrove produced three more runs to build it up to 13-7. A homer by Vern Strickland of Galt made it 13-8 and Lou Howard's homer in the ninth gave a final score of 13-9.

Wayne Edwards and Jim Furell both homered and singled for Galt. Vern Boomer singled and doubled. Ron Strickland, Lou Howard and Frank McMurrin all homered. Wray Upper doubled and Jack McNeil singled. Al Wingrove led the all-star attack with a double and two singles. Stu Hannant and Bob Bruce both singled and doubled. Earl Cairns homered and Len Coolich, Stan Henderson, Pete Kennedy, Jack Laking and Garry Field all singled.

Footnotes: The all-star pitching plans had to be radically altered as they had only three hurlers. Len McLaren of Georgetown had to rush his wife to the hospital and Roger Jacobs of Oakville failed to show up. Doug Hyatt of Milton (working) and Mario Schenck and Jim Wilson (sick) of Dundas also weren't on hand.

Defensively, Bob Bruce, Len Coolich and Al Wingrove stood out. Following the game, an informal garden party was held in Campbellville.

Daley Tosses Six Hitter In 29-1 Win

One fire that the Fire Fighters could not extinguish last Thursday was started by Dominion Hotel in one of the most lopsided scores of a marathon scoring softball season. The hotel crew jumped into a two-way tie for first place in the four team league by thoroughly walloping the Fire Fighters 29-1.

They banged out 32 hits from the slow ball offerings of Bill Williams, Ed Phillips and Jim Jordan. That included one home run, a triple and six doubles as well as oodles of bunts that had the smoke eaters' infield confused.

Scoring two runs in the first frame, three in the second, six in the fourth, two more in the fifth, four in the sixth, a pair in the seventh, six in the eighth and finishing up with three in the ninth, there was never any doubt of a win for the Dominion. Fire Fighters plated their sole run in the fifth by producing two back-to-back singles from the bats of Bill Williams and Bert Fowler.

Peppery Don Grein and smiling Jack Bullough were the big guns for the winners with five hits apiece. Grein's in eight appearances, Bullough's in seven, while Andy Williams, Ed Phillips and Gib Jordan batted out three apiece. Jordan poled the only home run of the game. Jack McCutcheon lashed out two doubles, and a triple in three trips to the plate when he went in to replace Bill Johnston in the sixth. Galt James hit four hits in seven tries.

MEANWHILE diminutive Frank Daley restricted the Fire Fighters to six hits while striking out 13. He walked two. Will Duval and Bert Fowler, with two hits apiece, were the only trimmen who could solve his pitches.

Sunday's All-star-Galt Terrier game made an auspicious opening for the renovated park. Spectators from all over the county to the number of 800 watched the All-stars of the County give the Senior Galt club a trimming.
