form all through his narration. When the township undertook to build a cantonment observatory in 1950 and the Free Press was chosen to produce an enlarged book for the occasion we were told there was only one picture of Mr. Norrish available for reproduction. When the photo was given us we were surprised to notice it was one we had taken with our two dollar Brownie camera. The old gentleman had posed for it sitting in his armchair in front of his home to please the whim of one neighborhood child.

As I recall there were three children all grown up when I knew them. There was Ernest in Toronto, Enoch in Pasadena, California and Mrs. Gooses in North Dakota. When father and mother made neighborly calls in the long winter evenings I always enjoyed going with them to visit the Norrishes. There were many interesting items in his collection, such as arrowheads and pieces of flint and other Indian relics. There was also a Chinese jack scratcher and a box with a battery in it and a small electric bulb on top which would light.

In those days there were no electric lights in the homes or buildings or about the streets. These are some of the memories that item stirred up, but I must stop before I get the whole neighborhood involved in this item.
