Fire Fighters' Elephant, Bear Unique in Civic Holiday Parade

Unique in the Civic Holiday parade in Oakville at the Firemen's convention were the float, Smokey the Bear and masquerading members of the Acton Fire Fighters Association. Acton delegates to the four-day convention were Harold Townsley and Phil McCristall.

Monday's parade attracted a crowd of 2,000 in Oakville for the parade that took 45 minutes to pass—Oakville-Citizens-Band led the parade and the Lorne Scots Band was one of the half dozen bands participating in the event. Seventeen year old Dianne Mitchell, Miss Ontario Fire Fighter, chosen in a Saturday contest, rode atop a float prepared by the Oakville Fire Department.

A horse-drawn steamer owned by Jack Pemberton and driven by Stan May and his team, led the parade. It was the oldest piece of fire fighting equipment in the parade.

Elephant, Bear
At the end came Acton with its elephant float seen here before. Jack Price was garbed as the maharajah. Herb Dodds was gorgeous as the maharajah and Bill Williams was the mahout. Other firemen, with darkened skin and turbans, acted as fan-

Some posed as beggars and collected money along the parade route for promotion of fire prevention and to improve the float.

Norm Prige was completely masked as Smokey the Bear representing the fire prevention campaign. Norm and Did Price made the costume.
