### Tips on Photography

## Movies—The Key to Sports Training



A rowing eye that sees all and forgets nothing is in the process of revolutionizing the training of the world's top athletes. Once a zealously-guarded secret weapon in the coaching profession, the movie camera has, after much setting a torrid scoring pace for Fergus Thistles of the Ontario Lacrosse Association, potted a hat trick (three) for the Thistles in a recent game . . . Roller hockey; becoming a popular summer pastime in arenas, is going over well in Guelph, where the Guelph Royal Rollers lead the league. Game is practically identical with ice hockey except the players use roller skates and play on a wooden or terrazzo floor . . .

The probing eye of the camera has helped train a generation of athletes. By carefully analyzing films, product, professional baseball teams have unclothed batting, pitching and fielding weaknesses virtually invisible to the human eye. Top golfers have cut strokes off their game by studying their swing and stance. College crews have regained championship status of stroke. Using such versatile tools as the movie camera, coaches have quickly spotted a defect in the style of a champion diver. Having a weak point in a boxer's style, revealed a damaging break in rhythm in the serve of a tennis player.

It's in football, however, that the movie camera has been given a high ranking, though non-salaried position on every coaching staff. Movies of every game and many practice sessions are painstakingly analyzed by virtually every professional and college coach and many high school coaches. Films of future opponents are studied just as carefully as an aid to planning strategy.

By using projectors with ranges of from five to 24 frames a second and control mechanism which permit instantaneous film reversal, coaches can discover the reason for a play's success or failure and how well the players carried out their assignments.

Although this is an unusual example of how movies can help make good athletes great, cine-photography in its various forms is helping improve individual and team performance in sports ranging from soccer to billiards.
