Roll Back Curtain on Country Club \$150,000 Project Year in the Making

Opening in mid-August, the Halton County Club, complete with nine-hole golf course, large sized swimming pool, and club house facilities was unveiled to the Free Press recently by Boris Trifonoff, president of Torra Holdings Co.

Located on 200 acres on Nassagawan's sixth line, just north of the Campbellville side road, and about 10 miles from Acton, the property has been under development for a year, Mr. Trifonoff reported.

The swimming pool, already completed, is 150 feet by 50 feet, tapering from a shallow 10 inch depth to nearly 10 feet with a 14 foot diving board. Set in a beautifully landscaped area, perched atop the 1,000 foot height of the escarpment, it provides a view of Lake Ontario on a clear day.

Annual Ready for Play
A nine-hole golf course with minimum drives of 150 yards to as much as 600 yards, winds its way over fairways already planted and almost ready for play, just requiring completion of the greens.

Two large barns on the property are being converted to provide club house facilities. The first phase of development is completed, providing a room 30 feet by 60 feet with a flagstone floor, open beamed ceiling, rough stone walls, wagon wheel chandeliers, snack facilities and tables already placed. Two other barns 60 feet by 50 feet and 60 feet by 35 feet are still to be developed for dining and reception rooms.

Atmosphere Unique
A unique atmosphere has been created in the club house facilities with the installation of oak paneled doors, leaded and stained glass windows all located at Mr. Trifonoff's combined wrecking yards in search of just the right material.

A dining terrace is located in front of the club house and change and washroom facilities finished in polyglucy plywood are provided in the building itself.

Public or Private?
Will the club be public or private? Mr. Trifonoff hasn't quite decided. If it was private, he visualizes a membership of possibly 100 families.

While the \$150,000 project has been under development for the past year, Mr. Trifonoff has been a resident on the property for the past ten years. He purchased the 150 acres in 1951 and presently the Halton Crushed Stone covers about 50 acres north of the club which will occupy 200 to 250 acres.

Crystal Clear Water

Filtration equipment for the swimming pool is installed and will provide for complete recirculation of the 120,000 gallons of water every six hours. Water will be crystal clear.

Still in the development plans are a children's playground area, croquet lawn, billiard room, horse stables and a-ten tennis courts. No definite decision has been reached on the use of the top floors of the two large concrete barns but one suggestion Mr. Trifonoff mentions is the development of convention or reception rooms.

Winter sports are planned and heating facilities are already installed in the club house section that is completed.

Weed Control News

by V. E. McARTHUR, COUNTY WEED INSPECTOR

FIELD BINDWEED MENACE TO FARMERS

Field bindweed is known by many common names, wild carrot, European bind weed, creeping Henry, small bindweed and small flowered morning glory, says the Field Crops Branch of the Ontario Department of Agriculture.

Bindweed is one of the most troublesome and difficult weeds to eradicate, owing to its very extensive root system, which may penetrate the soil from nine to 15 feet. The earlier methods of control were based entirely on intensive cultivation and summer following of the infested areas, but these have not given practical control.

Bindweed shoots can be killed by 2, 4-D but an appreciable kill of the underground stem is generally obtained only if the plants are approaching the flowering stage at the time of spraying. Normal soil spraying is usually too early but some farmers have had good results on bindweed by spraying when it could only be done by drop nozzles, 2, 4-D at 10 ounces per acre has been found to deeply penetrate the plant, quickly killing the roots.

It is impossible to eradicate bindweed with one spraying and as regrowth appears, it should be retreated. Two to three years of rigorous spraying as regrowth appears should completely eradicate this weed.
