A \$143,500 provincial government grant toward completion of miles northwest of Milton was announced today by Stanley E. Hall, M.P.P. (Halton). Mr. Hall, M.P.P., of the Ontario Progressive Conservative Party, announced the grant by Hon. W.M. Nickle, Minister of Commerce and Development.

Georgetown Hospital Serves 114 During it's First Month

One hundred and fourteen adults and children were admitted to the Georgetown and District Memorial Hospital in its first month of operation, hospital administrator Graham Gill today told the board of hospital directors in his initial report. Actually, the period covered in the report is slightly less than a month since the building opened its doors June 27.

The report contained some other interesting data, up to July 20, 186 patients had received medical care; 29 babies had been delivered, 8 major and 27 minor operations had been performed, 140 patients had been diagnosed in the X-ray department, 464 units of work had been done in the hospital lab.

Mr. Gillbody told directors that of the 112 people on the hospital staff, 89 are Georgetown residents. Some are from Acton and other centres not far away.

Government Lets Contracts Locally

Three contracts in Oakville firms and one to a Georgetown company were among a large number of contracts for \$10,000 or more, announced by the Dept. of Defense Monday.

The contracts let for the last half of June numbered 134 all told, and had a total value of \$9,029,519.

Perennial Chemicals of Canada Limited of Oakville was awarded two of the contracts. One for alcohol cleaning compound, valued at \$44,678. The other, also for alcohol cleaning compound, is valued at \$21,656.

The Ford Motor Company of Oakville received a contract valued at \$1,304 for cargo trucks. Vactor Associates of Canada Limited of Georgetown will supply electronic tubes valued at \$22,326.
