High School Staff Up Three With Six New Teachers Coming

Timetables at Acton high school bring an August pre-school poster to principal Ted Hansen. To make all the classes, subjects and teachers jibe so lessons and options all mesh into a day-long schedule is an annual puzzle that becomes more difficult each year as the school grows.

This fall, compared to last, there will be two extra full-time teachers, one new part-time teacher and one extra class. There will be 16 teachers including the principal, with Glenn Banks as music teacher part-time. Last year there were 14 altogether.

Mr. Hansen, who came back from his holidays twice to make reports at the school, has been working there every day so far in August—with timetables, grade XIII results and other administrative matters.

His increased duties this year limit the classes he will teach. He will instruct in grade 9 mathematics and will supervise study periods.

Staff and Subjects

Here's a run-down on the rest of the staff.

Russ Allan, who has just completed the teachers' summer course, comes from Toronto to teach his first year here. He has had previous experience in social work, and is married. He has his M.A. degree in English. He will teach English in grades 10, 11 and 13.

Miss Jean Barber returns to teach Latin in grades 10, 11, 12 and 13 and English in grade 12. Michael Bevan of Kleinburg, in his second year here, has the same subject—science in grade 10 and grade 13 biology; guidance in grade 9 and 12.

Thomas E. Carter, who has been in business previously, has just finished teachers' training and comes from Bramford to his first school. He is married and has a family. He will teach shop grades 9 and 10 and business practice in grade 9.

Miss June Conway, a graduate of Western University who took the summer course, comes from Kincardine and teaches her first year here with French in grades 9 and 10—her subjects.

William Coats will be back taking mathematics in grades 9 and 13 and physics in grades 11 and 13.

Wayne Coyle teaches boys' physical education and grade 10 history in his second year here.

Oscar Drijber of Rockwood returns to teach mathematics in grades 9 to 12.

Mrs. J. Galloway again teaches commercial and girls' physical education.

G. A. Jaeger, another new teacher, starts his second year in the profession teaching middle and upper school French and lower school English. Last year he was at Essex high school. He is single.

John Lee of Toronto has just graduated from University Col-

lege and took the summer course. She will teach history and some girls' physical education.

Mrs. Hazel Orr, who has just finished a summer course, will teach home economics, one class of business practice and one of mathematics.

Mrs. Grace Riggs returns to teach lower school English and middle school history.

Clarence Rogvaldson will teach all the geography classes again.

Oscar Van Binbergen in his second year here will teach science in grade 9, chemistry in grades 12 and 13 and one class of grade 9 mathematics.

The music option has been introduced again this fall—the first time since 1953. Glenn Banks will teach two grades of grade 9 music option, which might continue to grade 10 next year. Other options are home economics or shop. Mr. Banks has been public school music supervisor for several years.

Mrs. M. Blow will be school secretary part-time. The caretakers are again Rudolph Spolovogel and Ken McKinnon, who have been cleaning the school this summer. Part of the building has also been painted during the holidays.

Meeting Lacks Quorum No Decisions Possible

Lack of quorum prevented Acton Planning Board from making any decisions at their meeting Tuesday evening but several articles of business were reviewed.

Secretary-treasurer Jack McGeachie informed the three members present about a request from William Finley, Churchill Road North, to purchase a vacant lot owned by the town. This piece of land, 50 feet by 130 feet, located between properties owned by Harry Shortill and Mr. Finley, has been kept mowed and weeds cut by Mr. Shortill.

Board members discussed any possibility of using the land for a road extension but ruled this out. Although no decision was made it was agreed by those present the sensible solution would be to advertise the land for sale and accept the highest offer.
