SCOUT NEWS

In the very near future, we will be asking all parents of Scouts and Cubs for the annual registration fee and I would like to clarify the purpose of this registration.

Each fall, at the beginning of the scout year, we must register our troops and packs with Provincial Headquarters.

A registration fee of 50¢ per cub and \$1.00 per scout must accompany this registration. This fee is required by provincial headquarters to help supplement the cost of training leaders, maintain provincial and regional staffs, pay for insurance which covers each and every scout or cub injured or any organized scout or cub activity and many other functions without which our movement could not possibly operate at its present standard.

Total Payment
This registration fee of \$1.00 per year is the total payment we make each year for all of the services received. The 10¢ you son takes with him to meetings is held in the troop or pack funds and is maintained by the troop treasurer.

This money is spent on such things as badges, neckerchiefs, training books etc. These accounts are maintained by the troop treasurer, who is elected by the Court of Honor, and the books are available at any time for inspection.

Group Committee Funds
You may wonder where the money goes that is raised during the year by the Group Committee. I cannot give you the exact expenditures as they are under the control of Mr. Middleton who, I am sure, will make them available to any interested party.

However, I do know that it costs the Group Committee approximately \$20.00 a month to maintain our Scout Hall, which is used by over 250 boys, and girls weekly. Also this year, they spent around \$400.00 on camping equipment, which included five very good tents and as a result, we were able to conduct a summer camp for the scouts as well as a weekend camp for the cubs and hope to have many more in the near future.

They also offset the variation between the amount charged each week to camp and the actual cost of the camp, which amounted to approximately \$150. On top of this, in the past year the committee has managed to liquidate the mortgage on our scout hall. This has been without a doubt, the most cooperative and energetic Group Committee I have ever had the honor to work with.

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Tipson Touring

Women's Travel Authority

When I mothers have discovered that motoring with youngsters can be a breeze instead of a tornado. The trick is to keep the children, especially the very young, busy and happy.

Here are three of my travel-tested tips: the mystery box, the wiggle platform and the shoe-bag-filling-scheme.

The mystery box is a 60x60x18 trunkcase tin. Before leaving home, secretly decorate it and fill it with inexpensive toys, wrapped separately in festive paper. Then, on the trip, when the youngsters show signs of restlessness or boredom, pull out the mystery box and let them choose one toy at a time. Note: select soft toys, wooden models, drawing books — things that won't hurt the child or distract the driver.

The wiggle platform is a rest or play area in the back of the car. To make one, stack luggage on the floor until it's level with the back seat. Over this, place a cot or air mattress, cover with a quilt. Take a pillow for each child.

The shoe bag is hung over the back of the front seat.
