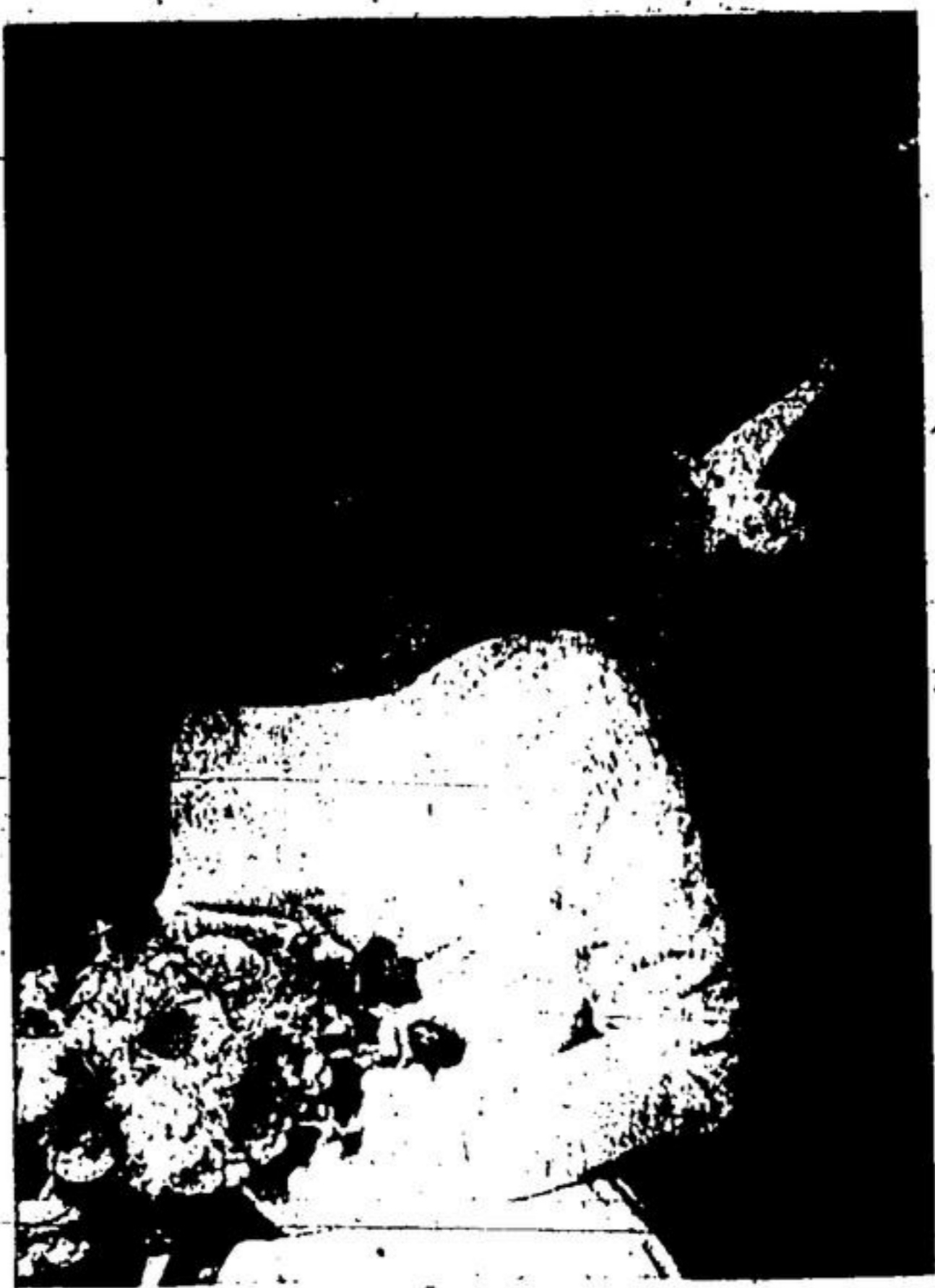

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Writer Explains Parties Invites Public to Attend

Acton, Ontario, August 21, 1961.

The Free Press, Acton, Ont. Dear Sir,

This is an open letter and an open invitation to the public regarding the teenage parties we have been having on Saturdays nights here for some of the teenagers in town.

We would like to invite publicly any or all of the teenagers parents or anyone interested and especially those who are complaining to come and see exactly how the parties are conducted. They are well chaperoned (at the suggestion of the teen-agers) and the back yard where they are held is well lighted and everything is within the law.

Firemen Answer Sunday Calls

Acton firefighters were kept on the run Sunday when the siren sounded on two occasions to make them don boots and coats and rush to answer calls. The first call summoned them to the home of Mr. and Mrs. Stan Norton, Church St., where a space heater became overheated. No water was necessary and in a short time, everything was under control and the truck loaded with firemen returned to the hall.

Quick Tour

The same day, firemen made a quick tour of the block when the siren sounded and an alarm was given that a fire had broken out at the A-B Supermarket on Mill St.

Rushing around the corner from the fire hall, firemen were greeted at the store by a number of people who informed them a lighted match or cigarette had been tossed into the open awning but no fire had resulted.

Two holes were burned in the canvas awning but it was unnecessary for firemen to alight from the truck as no flames had developed.
