Bestow 33rd Degree On Dr. A. J. Buchanan

Past District Deputy Grand Master for Wellington District Right Worshipful Brother Dr. J. A. Buchanan had the 33rd degree, A.A. & S.R. bestowed upon him recently during the Annual Communications of the Supreme Council held at St. Andrews-by-the-Sea, New Brunswick.

Starting his career in masonry in April, 1920, Dr. Buchanan first joined Scot Lodge 421 in Grand Valley and was passed and raised in the same Lodge. He became affiliated with Walker Lodge No. 321, Acton, in 1934 and was Worshipful Master in 1952. He recently terminated his office as D.D.G.M. of Wellington District.

In May 1946, he joined the Scottish Rite A.A. & S.R. at Guelph, was elevated to Rose Croix the same year and received his 32nd degree in the fall of 1950 at Hamilton.

His recent degree brings the total lodge members in Canada holding such a degree to less than 500.

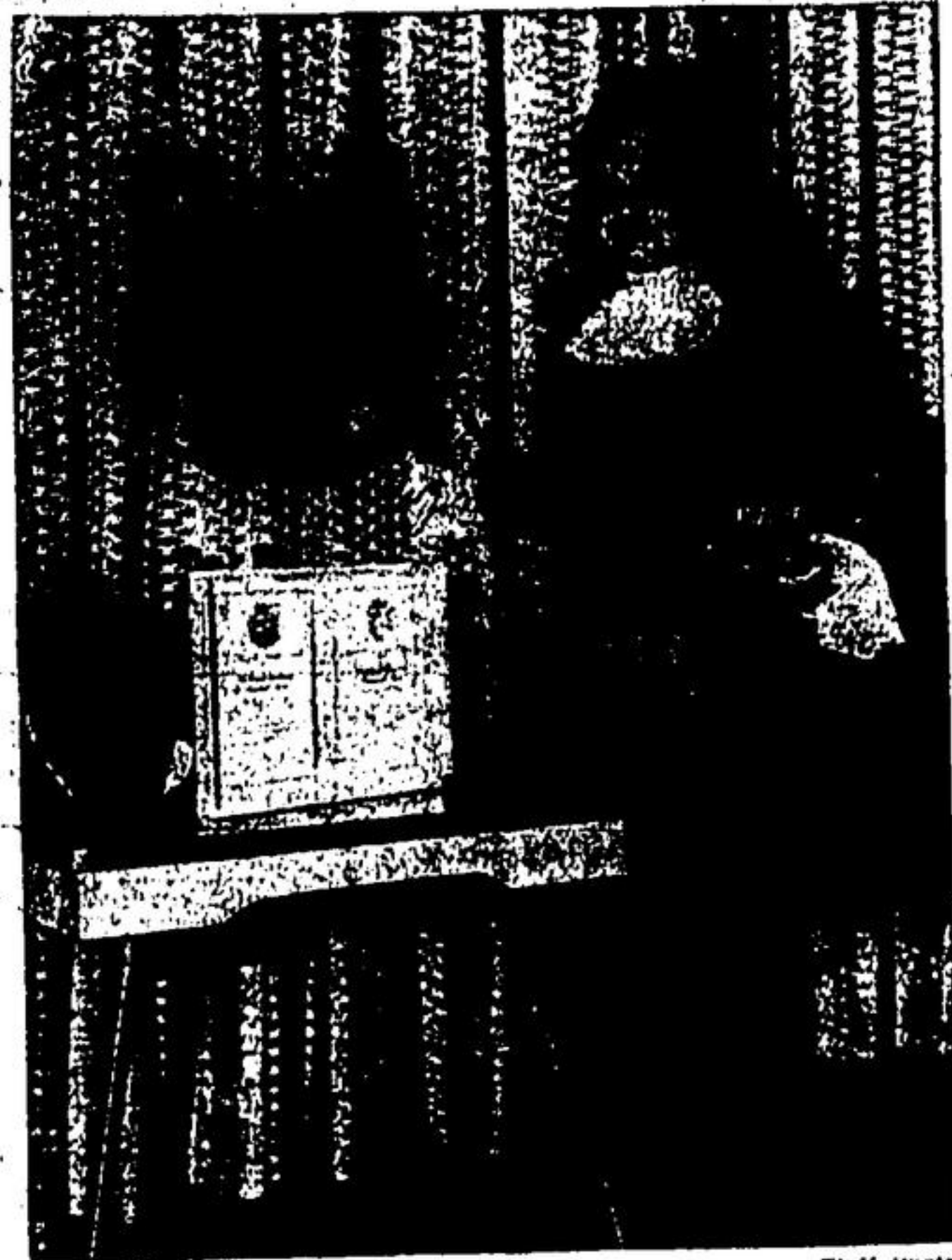
