# Tanners Take Softball Title

## Hang Firemen's Hides Up

Beardmore's U.P.W.A. Tanners proved conclusively that they are worthy heirs to the Acton Softball Association crown, won last year by Dominion Hotel. The Tanners dropped Acton Firelighters for the third straight time last Thursday to win the title without losing a playoff game.

One of the smallest playoff crowds saw Timmy's team allow the firemen to take a 2-0 lead in the top of the third inning Thursday, but then come back with four runs in the bottom half for a lead they never relinquished. Final score was 12-8.

**Seaman Success** It was the end of another successful season for the Acton club. The leatherworkers went into first place in the league early in July and played tetter-to-tetter with Dominion Hotel for that top spot through the rest of the schedule, only clinching it in the last couple of games.

Firelighters, a different team from the one that shared a cellar spot through most of the schedule, came alive during the playoffs and polished off last year's champions, Dominion Hotel, in three games. Some of the filberts thought the firemen would be strong enough to do the same with the league leaders.

However, Timmy Masales, with one of the best balanced teams ever to play in the league, had ambitions for a title as well. His club was strong on pitching, could hit and field well and had plenty of hustle. They took the finals 9-6 but were outlived by plenty.

One of the largest crowds of the season showed up for the second game of the series expecting another close contest. The Tanners, however, walloped Jack Newton's men 11-2 and looked very strong doing it.

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**Merchants Lose** A win over Oakville Oaks sandwiched in between victories over Acton Merchants on Saturday. Monday gave Dundas Graftons a stranglehold on the current Halton County Senior "B" round robin baseball series. The three wins virtually assured the strong Dundas club a berth in the O.B.A. Senior "B" playoffs.

Acton's two losses, here on Saturday 7-3 and in Dundas on Monday, 6-5, eliminated the Merchants from contention. Oakville has a mathematical chance of prolonging the series if they can defeat Acton twice and beat Dundas in the return game but it seems likely Graftons will represent Halton in the O.B.A. finals.

**Eight Errors** The Dundas club had no difficulty lacking a win up here, in Saturday's intense heat. ## GARBAGE COLLECTION

This is to advise that Council has decided that one collection only of garbage shall be made each week on and after Monday, October 2nd, 1961.

One weekly collection shall be maintained for the period through to March 31st, 1962, without exception.

The collection shall be made on each Monday unless a holiday falls on this day in which case the collection shall be made on the next regular working day.

The dump will be open to the public from Monday to Saturday of each week.

For your information certain sections of the garbage by-law No. 903 are quoted herewith:-

**SECTION 4.**

The workmen shall not be required to empty any container weighing more than fifty pounds and which is not placed on the boundary line between the street and the assessed property as determined by surveyor's stakes by the occupant of the property.

**SECTION 5.**

The workmen shall collect all refuse set out for them providing it does not exceed more than five containers or bundles for the assessed property and/or each family and providing further that each container or bundle does not weigh in excess of fifty pounds, and providing further that the total refuse so set out does not weigh more than a total of two hundred pounds per assessed premises or family and providing further that it is in proper containers or securely tied for handling and the bundle does not exceed four feet in length, and providing further that all empty cartons are broken down and securely tied for handling.

These two sections of the by-law will be strictly enforced, and in case of contravention containers will not be picked up but left at the premises involved.
