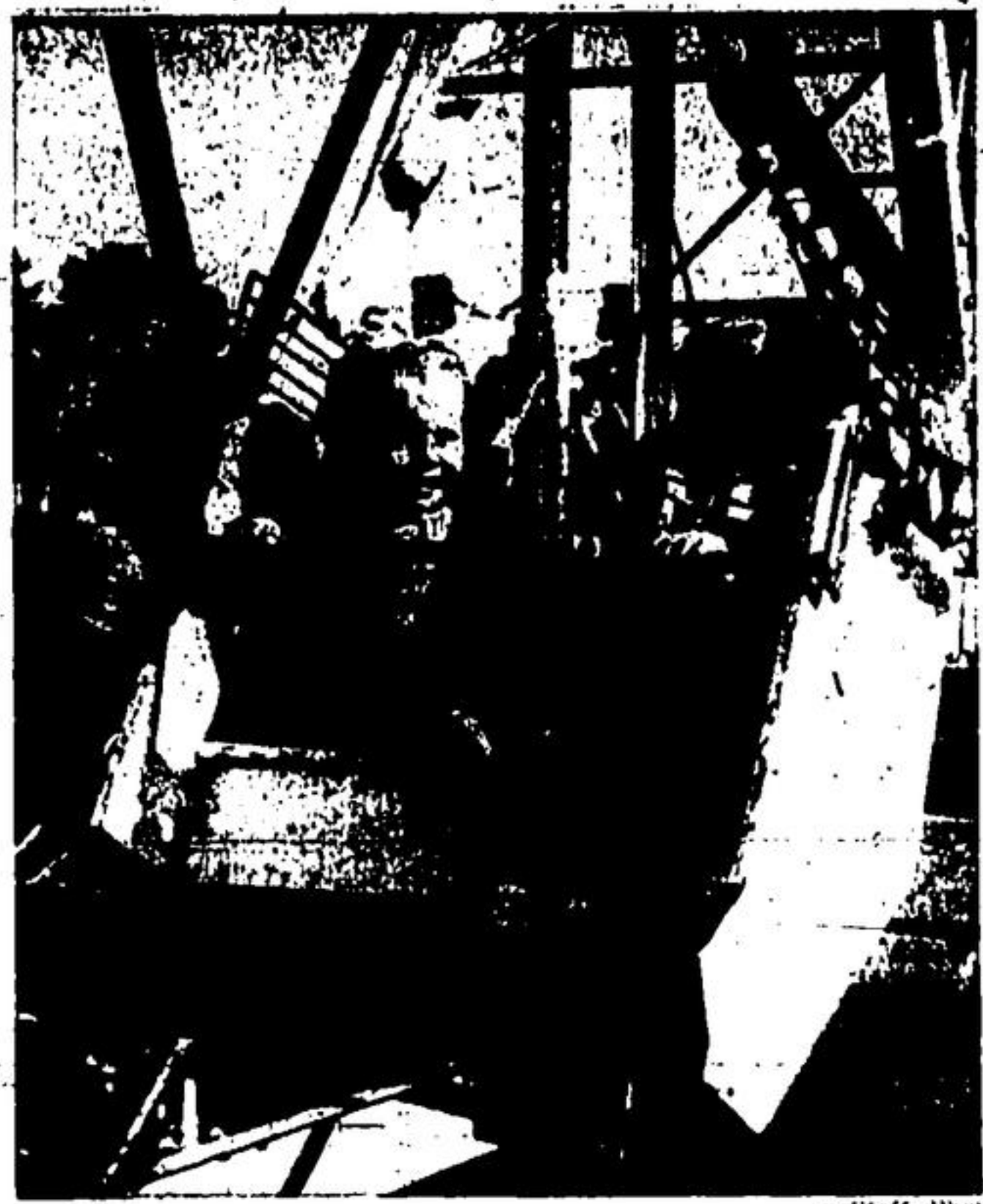

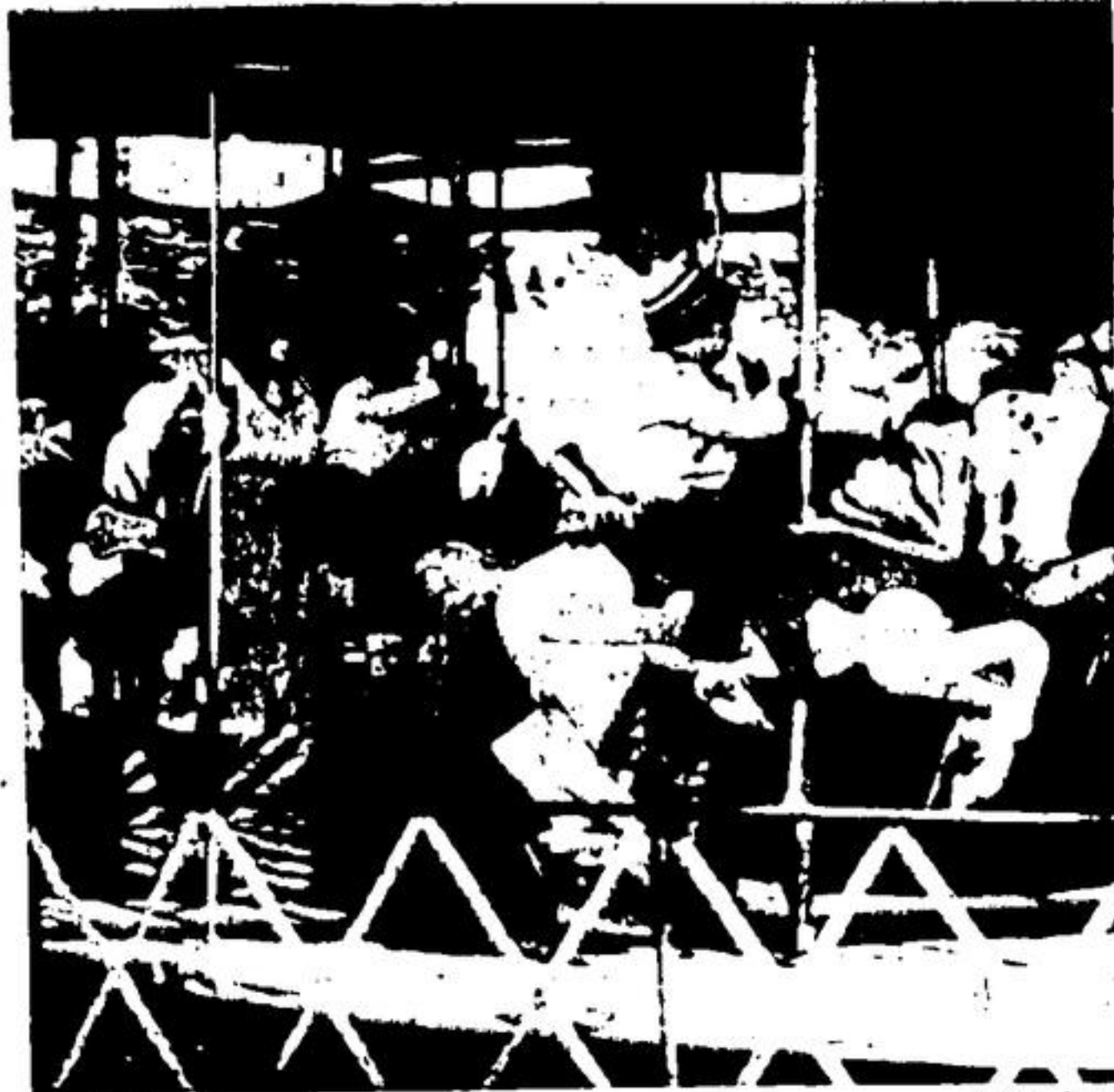
Carol Wharton To Open School

Halton Jerseys Win Ex Prizes

Mac Alexander and Sons of Norval, Kenneth Ella and Sons of Hornby, and M. W. Staples of Guelph represented Halton County in the Jersey exhibits at the Canadian National Exhibition.

M. W. Staples got first for his two year old bull which is owned jointly with Alfred Bagg and Sons. This bull, Edgedale Acme Superior, headed the State Herd in which Halton County placed fourth.

Mac Alexander and his boys won second for junior bull calf, fourth and ninth for senior bull calf, second for junior yearling, and fourth for two year old bull. The junior heifer calf placed ninth; Senior heifer calf, 12th; senior yearling heifer, eighth; dry two year old, 10th; two year old in milk, 10th; three year old in milk, sixth; four year old in milk, fifth.

Kenneth Ella and Sons got eighth in the senior bull calf class, and sixth in the junior yearling bull. In the junior yearling heifer class, they were fifth, in the senior yearling heifer class, they were 11th and 15th.

Acton 4-H Forage Club Complete Final Project

The Acton 4-H Forage Club completed their program with 100 per cent completion. This involves each member enrolling in the club completing their club project. The finals in the 4-H club program were held at the home of club leader Nino Braida.

In the 4-H forage club project, each club member establishes a one acre forage plot from certified varieties of forage. A series of meetings are held to discuss forage management.



The club is under the direction of J. Douglas Burnside, assistant agricultural representative, and club leaders Fyle Somerville and Nino Braida.

The local sponsoring organization is the Acton Agricultural Society, which sponsors the club in cooperation with the Ontario and Canada Departments of Agriculture.

In assessing the club program, each club member is scored on the basis of 1,000 marks. The club has its own executive, who are in charge of meetings.
