KILL EARLY SPRING WEED IN THE FALL

Yellow rocket is one of the fastest spreading weeds in this part of Ontario. In May of this year, we were quite alarmed to see so many fields yellow with this early spring weed. It usually appears for the first time on a farm in a field which has been newly seeded. There seems to be plenty of this kind of circumstantial evidence to assume that rocket seed is sometimes present in clover seed.

The government was aware of the seriousness of yellow rocket when, back in 1957, it classed it as a primary noxious weed under the Canada Seeds Act. Since that time, farmers who have used No. 1 grade clover seed have had the protection of this Act. No. 1 clover seed cannot contain even one yellow rocket seed. So the best way to prevent acquiring rocket is to make sure that you are seeding down with quality clover seed and grass seeds.

However, yellow rocket can be

controlled and according to the Ontario Department of Agriculture, the fall of the year is the proper time to do this job. In the early spring, many fields are too wet for spraying equipment and very often clovers are present, and in this case the necessary chemical to kill yellow rocket will seriously damage alfalfa and red clover.

Extensive tests of control measures have been conducted by the Ontario Department of Agriculture which have resulted in the following recommendations for 1961. M.C.P. applied at the rate of six ounces acid as amine per acre, at a cost of 60 cents per acre for material, has given fairly good results.

2.4DB, applied at 20 ounces acid as ester in 20 gallons of water per acre, with the cost of material per acre \$4.00, this application in late September or early October when the legumes have been killed by the fall frost has resulted in excellent control of yellow rocket with no damage to clovers.

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

"Our Biggest Week of Year"

A full program to mark Fire Prevention Week, October 8 to 14, is being planned by members of the Halton County Fire Prevention Bureau. One company inspection will conduct the theme of this year's national week of fire prevention is "Don't burn commercial buildings in Acton and Georgetown to prevent possible fire hazards to others."

This promises to be the biggest week of the year for close to 900 firefighters in the nine Halton house fire departments and school districts, said Dan Cherrington, chairman of the Fire Prevention Bureau.
