

R.C.A.F. Officer, Bride Married In St. Alban's by Candlelight

A couple who came back to Canada from Germany for their marriage made the return trip their honeymoon. Flying Officer and Mrs. Carl Frederick Swenson-Rosenquist were married Friday evening, September 8, in the Church of St. Alban the Martyr and flew from Malton Saturday to New York, where they boarded the S.S. Bremen to return to Germany.

The bride, the former Adrienne Yvonne Brunelle, left her Toronto teaching post after five years to teach at the R.C.A.F. school in Baden-Baden, Germany, where she has been for the past two years. There she met her R.C.A.F. officer husband, who also returned to Canada for their marriage ceremony.

Came from West
The bride is the daughter of Mrs. Mary Osborne of Acton and the groom is the son of the Rev. and Mrs. Eric Swenson-Rosenquist of Edmonton, Alberta. His 85-year-old grandmother from Edmonton and other relatives came to Ontario to be present.

All-white gladiolas in baskets and white bows on the pews decorated the church for the candlelight ceremony at seven o'clock, Friday, September 8. The Rev. Donald West officiated at the double-ring ceremony and Mrs. Frank Oakes played the organ.

Trousseau from Europe
The bride brought her trousseau home from Europe with her. Her wedding gown of finest French velvet was made in Germany. The street length strapless dress was softly gathered at the waist with intricate panneling adding fullness to the skirt. Over this, she wore a jacket of French lace with a rounded high neckline and three-quarter length sleeves.
