**Firefighters Wait For Radio Equipment**

Halton's firefighters are anxiously awaiting the arrival of their new mutual aid radio system, but its installation in the nine halls and trucks has been delayed.

To date, County Council, the Province and the Federal government have approved the \$19,178 expenditure. However, the Motorola Company, which submitted the low tender hasn't been able to obtain a frequency for the radio yet.

**Hole In Month**

County Mutual Aid Co-Ordinators Douglas Wilson of Oakville told a Mutual Aid fire association meeting last week that he hoped the radio would be installed within the next month.

The Mutual Aid organization will have a company representative at their next meeting to teach the fundamentals of the set-up to them.

The firefighters are also planning some instruction for firemen in lighting propane gas fires.

**Georgetown Farmer Wins Competition**

The judge for the South Central Ontario Zone, Howard Henry of the Field Crops Branch has announced that Fred Nurse, Georgetown, R. R. 2, is the winner of the zone pasture management competition.

This competition is open to county winners in Peel, Halton, Brant, Lincoln, Wellington and Waterloo counties.

In Ontario, 875 farm operators competed in pasture management competition. In determining the county winners, all phases of farm management in relation to pasture production are considered. There are five zone winners in the province and Mr. Nurse will be competing with these five winners for the Ontario Pasture Management championship.

**Finals Next Week**

The judging in the Ontario finals will take place October 2, 3 and 4. The judges for the championship competition will be Dr. W. F. Tossell, head of the Field Husbandry Department, Ontario Agricultural College; George Gear, agricultural representative, Bruce county; Charlie Munro, dairy farmer, Elgin, and Douglas Parks, head of Field Husbandry, Kemptville agricultural school.

If gaining a standing in the provincial finals, Mr. Nurse has shown the result of several years' competition in the Halton Pasture Competition, sponsored by the Halton Soil and Crop Improvement Association.
