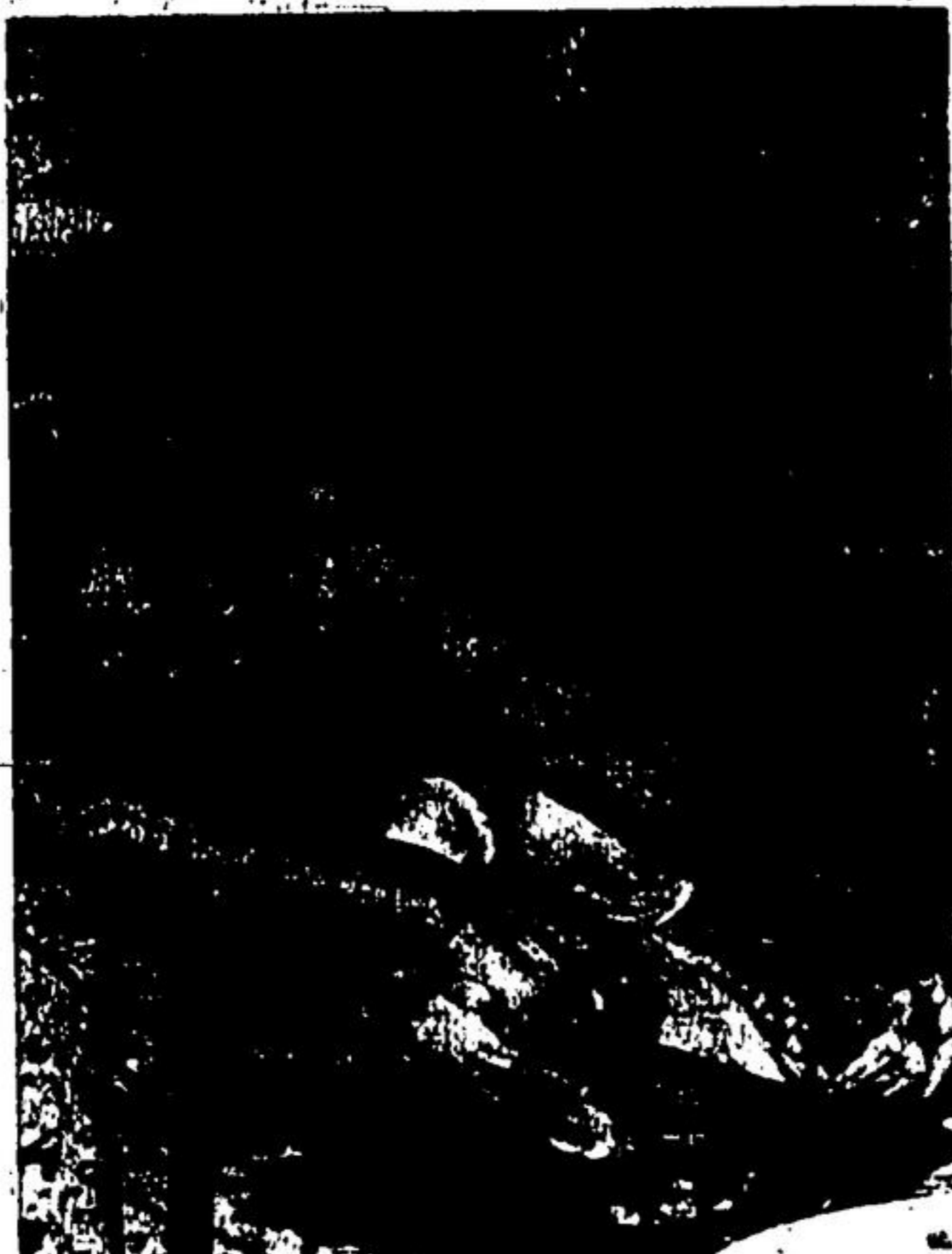

Installation of the artificial ice plant is continuing at the arena, grading of the arena floor and excavation for the new Community Centre has begun.

**Acton C.W.L. Delegates Enjoy Convention Panel Discussion**

On Sunday, September 17, the president, Mrs. H. Coles, accompanied by Mrs. J. Tuers, treasurer and Mrs. J. Doherty, second vice-president, attended a session of the 14th annual Provincial Convention of the Catholic Women's League of Canada, held at Hamilton. After attending Mass at the Cathedral of Christ the King, the ladies enjoyed a Communion Breakfast with 250 other delegates in the adjoining school auditorium. Miss M. Burns, National President, addressed the group.

Returning to the Sheraton Room of the Sheraton-Comnaught hotel, an enlightening panel discussion on "The Parental Role in Sex Education" was given by two married and single women moderated by Rev. Hubert Poock, S.M.M. This panel was a highlight of the convention and so well received that tape-recordings of the talk will shortly be made available to all parish councils for presentation to the local groups. The aim of the discussion

is to encourage thinking and reading and to combat taboos, ignorance and misapprehension.

Conveners reports at the convention revealed that the C.W.L. in Ontario raised over three-quarters of a million dollars last year, most of which was spent in parish work. They also donated \$37,000 to World Refugee Year Campaign and spent \$60,000 on education and \$63,000 on Welfare Work.
