1962 Ford Galaxie Models Offer Engineering Advances

The 1962 Ford Galaxie will be finless and will be the first regular production model in automotive history to have a factory-recommended 6,000 mile service interval. John D. King, vice-president-marketing, Ford Motor Company of Canada, Limited, made this announcement today.

"The engineering advances mean that the average 12,000-mile-year Galaxie owner will have his normal maintenance timetable reduced to a twice per year operation plus, of course, the usual running checks necessary for safe and sensible operation of his car," Mr. King said.

Mr. King said that in addition to the many self-maintenance features incorporated in the Galaxie last year, the 1962 models will offer such new features as: —30,000 mile lubrication for wheel bearings; —A radiator coolant providing protection down to 40 degrees below zero and good for 30,000 miles or two years; —Extended fuel filter life of 30,000 miles; —A recommended oil change interval of 6,000 miles.

Other features include a 30,000 mile chassis lubrication, self-adjusting brakes, self-adjusting parking brake, double wrapped aluminum muffler and underbody parts specially processed to guard against rust and corrosion. Ford Galaxie will have seat belt anchors as standard equipment. Complete safety belt installation will be offered as optional equipment.

The Galaxie for 1962 will go on display in Ford dealerships across Canada this week.

Her letter read in part, "We are going through a bad spell now. Unemployment is rife here! Every week, men are being laid off. It seems a general depression is coming on. The women of the homes have had to turn to work wherever they can get it and the older women look after the children."

"We have had a terrible summer—every day, the same scorching heat. The fruit on the trees has shrivelled up. The temperature is 90 to 98 with not a drop of rain for four months. We were glad to see the sun go down at night. We are already short of potatoes."

"Many of the season's crops just died on the ground from the heat and dryness. Most farmers are hand-feeding their cows as there is so little growth in the pastures." Mrs. Rospin is secretary-treasurer of a Women's Institute branch. She included some clipping recounting meetings in her letter.
