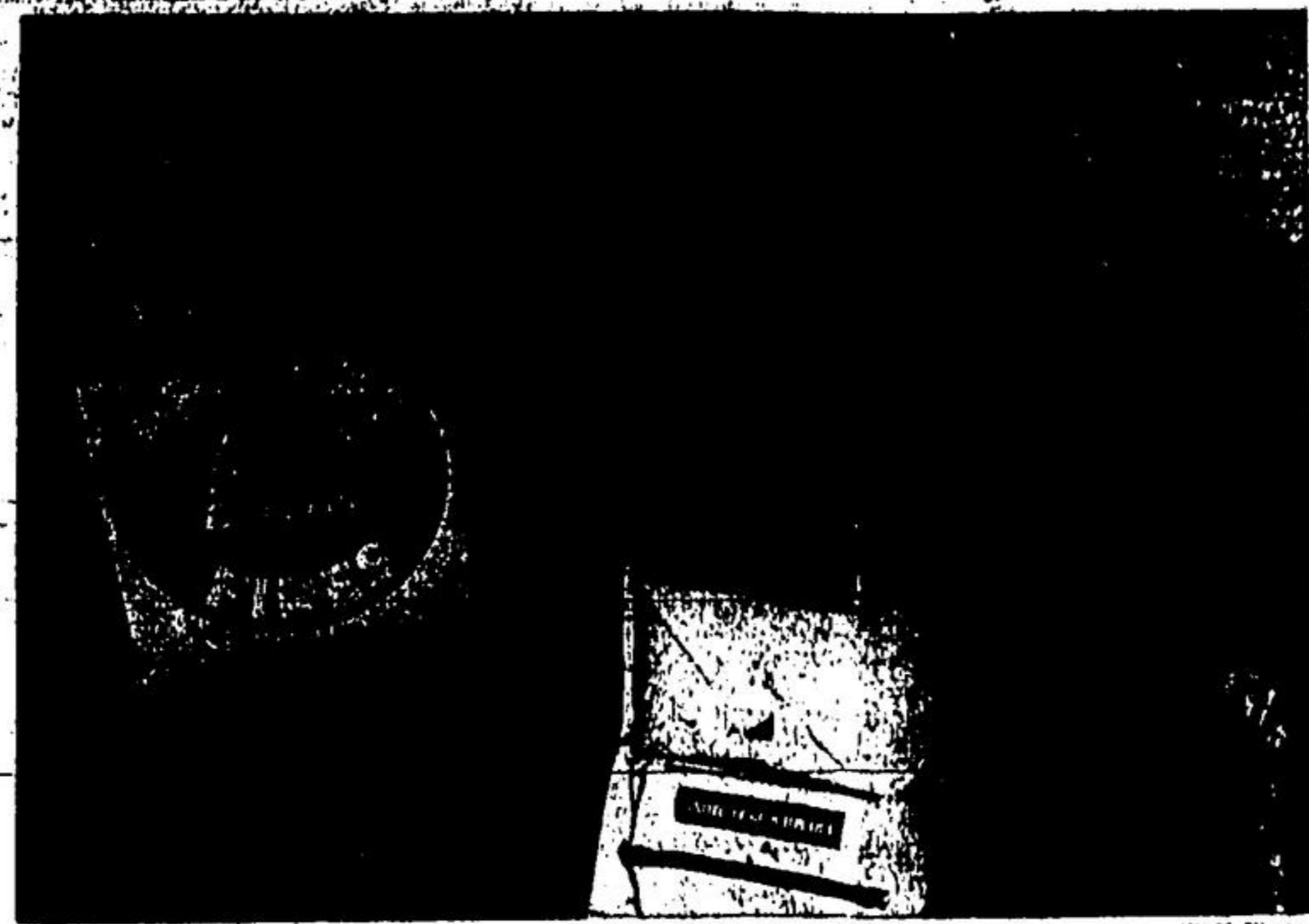
Hydro workmen are still painting light standards around town.
