Hire Architects Drill for Water For Limehouse Central School

Esquerring School Board cleared the way for the construction of a new central school at Limehouse last night (Wednesday) when they engaged architects Barnett and Rieder to prepare plans and hired John Sproul to search for water at the proposed site.

When the design for the new school is completed and tenders let, construction is expected to begin as soon as possible. Meanwhile, Mr. Sproul will be asked to drill for a water supply immediately.

Mrs. Ada Nuttall of North Bruce was engaged as a teacher for the Esquerring School Board Area and is expected to sign a contract in the near future. Another teacher applying for a position will be interviewed and if hired will teach at the Glen Williams School.

In order to expedite business, the board agreed to hold two regular meetings a month. Meetings will be held the first and third Tuesday of the month at 8 p.m. and will adjourn at 11 p.m., unless notice is served to continue until 11:30.

An amplifying system was set up by Bob Lansborough in the basement of the Baptist Church so the service is heard by mothers who stay with small children there.



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
