Hire Architects, Drill for Water For Limehouse Central School

Esquimes School Board cleared the way for the construction of a new central school at Limehouse last night (Wednesday) when they engaged architects Barnett and Rieder to prepare plans and hired John Sprawl to search for water at the proposed site.

When the design for the new school is completed and tenders let, construction is expected to begin as soon as possible. Meanwhile, Mr. Sprawl will be asked to drill for a water supply immediately.

Mrs. Ada Nuttall of North Bruce was engaged as a teacher for the Esquimes School Board Area and is expected to sign a contract in the near future. Another teacher applying for a position will be interviewed and if hired will teach at the Glen Williams School.

In order to expedite business, the board agreed to hold two regular meetings a month. Meetings will be held the first and third Tuesday of the month at 8 p.m. and will adjourn at 11 p.m., unless notice is served to continue until 11.30.

Requests from parents desiring their children to be transported to school sparked a brief discussion. The transportation committee was instructed to investigate the situation and bring in a recommendation at the next meeting.

School bus drivers will be advised not to allow pupil passengers to leave the bus enroute home to shop for candies. This decision was reached when notice of complaints from parents was received.
